Pastor's Ponderings

This year, winter arrived in January – well after dreams of white Christmases had faded from our minds. And when it finally came, it blew in like a great storm. And it kept on storming for weeks on end... And then the sky came down in sheets of ice.

Ah! The wonders of winter!

Ordinarily I like winter. Temps under 20* make me feel alive! I love walking in the hush of darkness when the air is filled with sparkling snowflakes and all you hear is the crunch of those which have already fallen... This is most true when the temperature is below 0*!

It's also a time when I feel especially close to God. Yes, the beauty is astounding. (How *did* God make each flake so different from every other flake? Their composition is simply two atoms of hydrogen and an atom of oxygen. How can anything so complex come from that?) Because life is pared down to the most basic essentials in winter, the depth of God's love for humankind is more fully witnessed. The fewer the extraneous stimuli, the more able we are to hear, see and taste the wonders God has wrought.

In Isaiah 55 we hear God saying:

Just as the rain and the snow come down from the sky and don't return there without watering the earth, making it conceive and yield plants and providing seed to the sower and food to the eater, so is my word that comes from my mouth; it does not return to me empty.

Instead, it does what I want, and accomplishes what I intend.



Amidst the dark silence of winter, the snow waters our inner most beings so we can experience a deeper spiritual life. Hydrated in that darkness, God's word more ably seeps into our beings. If we but allow it, that word can sink into our hearts making them soft so God can work through them to benefit all of God's creation.

This is why I believe our capacity to respond to the nudgings of God's Holy Spirit is surprisingly strong during winter.

At least unless the sky comes down in sheets of ice.

It's hard to sense God's presence when the electricity has blown because the lines are overladen with ice, and the house is 43* and it's all you can do to shiver under several layers of clothes along with several more layers of blankets.

That was the day I felt as though ice had created a wall between God's love and me. Try though as I might I couldn't keep my focus on God's hopeful word. I felt empty, isolated and alone.

Those moments provided a deeper appreciation for the mental health needs of people who are confined away from loved ones – be it due to divisive arguments, ill health, or yes, ice storms. And though May is traditionally Mental Health Awareness month I want to bring your attention to the subject now.

Our society has endured a long period of tumultuous change, anxiety, and frustration. This leads to emotional fatigue and many people are on edge even if they don't realize it. To complicate matters, since the first of this year, this congregation has experienced a surprising number of hospitalizations and ongoing illnesses. I suspect that all of us are seeing we're not quite as young or resilient as we once were. Our mental health is being stretched thin.

And yet...

And yet, I also see a people – all children of God - whose hearts are regularly refreshed and renewed through God's word. Inspired by that word, you look for the good in each day and you continue to serve as best you can even in the coldest months. For some, this means shoveling the walks around the church after a snowfall. For others it's organizing events to draw your church family together in worship or for a time of respite. For

still others your service is making sure warm hats and gloves are distributed to folks who have limited shelter. Most importantly, all of you continue to pray for the world and those around you. And prayer is the greatest service anyone can offer. Your very lives ensure God's word does not return empty but accomplishes what our Creator desires.

Your prayers encourage your inner being to grow strong. Your prayers fill your reservoirs back up and will enable you to serve God in one more way: As the cold lingers a while longer, I invite you to serve God by making phone calls to say "Hi! How're you doing?" to one another... and to people you know outside of your church family. You may never know it, but sometimes these calls are a lifeline to someone who is struggling against the ice storms of their private lives.

Certainly, the elders and deacons are making calls like these... But this is something we can all do to lift one another up — while lifting our own hearts to ever brighter places! When I was a young and bored teen my mom would tell me go visit/call an elderly aunt or uncle or neighbor. Truth be told, I wasn't very good at following through on that, but when I did, I heard the joy in their voice and came away from the time feeling upbeat — maybe even happy!

Come to think of it, the next two verses of Isaiah seem to underscore Mom's advice:

Yes, you will go out with celebration, and you will be brought back in peace.

Even the mountains and the hills will burst into song before you; all the trees of the field will clap their hands.

In place of the thorn the cypress will grow; in place of the nettle the myrtle will grow.

This will attest to the LORD's stature, an enduring reminder that won't be removed.

Winter can be a season full of crystalline beauty as well as one that can freeze our hearts in two inches of ice, cutting us off from the people and things we love. Yet even in the cold God's word is available to water us each day. And God's word encourages us to grow strong like the cypress and the myrtle so that in service to others we can attest to the Lord's stature.

May you go out into the wonders of winter in celebration of God's word! ~ Pastor Deb ~

ASHES TO ASHES...

Ash Wednesday is the first day of the 40-day liturgical season of Lent. We celebrate the day as the beginning of a special time to devote ourselves to remembering who we are as God's unruly children - and work to follow Jesus' way more closely in the future.

Ashing oneself in times of mourning or in shame has a long history in the Old Testament. In the early times of Christianity, faith leaders drew a cross using ashes on the foreheads of the faithful on the first day of Lent. This reminded them they had died to their old ways of living in favor of Christ's new way. The ashes symbolized their human frailty and hope that because Jesus had died for the forgiveness of their sins they need no longer fear separation from God through death.

In the 1500's this marking became associated with Roman Catholic rituals so fell out of favor with Protestant Christians. However, in the mid-Twentieth Century, some congregations revived the

practice as a way to help deepen their faith reflections during the season. Since then, many, many Presbyterian, Methodist, Lutheran and Episcopal churches have readopted the ritual.

While we will not gather for a formal Ash Wednesday service this year, Pastor Deb is offering to mark the beginning of Lent for you with ashes. On Wednesday, March 2, between noon and 1:15pm, you'll find her in the Trinity chapel. There she'll pray with you and, if you like, place the mark of the cross on your forehead to remind you to reflect on your life ways as Jesus' disciple. To receive this prayerful mark, please enter through the door beside the labyrinth.

Dear Trinity United Presbyterian Church,

February new year greetings to you! I hope you all are well, warm, and have enjoyed some snow on the ground these past weeks. Leandro was delighted to play in his first snowfall – snowman, snow angels and all.

Our partners, on the other hand, are in the sun of southern hemisphere summertime – closing academic years and preparing for new ones. The Evangelical Church of Peru's (IEP) Sicuani Seminary celebrated the graduation of 16 of its students in December. After the institution's closure for the entirety of 2020, this graduation was a blessing for these graduates.

As the IEP denomination celebrates every student and their perseverance during these challenging times, they also mourn the passing of Jesusa Chavez, a leader of the IEP's Women's League and a close friend and partner of the PC (USA). Jesusa was diagnosed with lymphoma cancer in August and was undergoing chemotherapy when she was infected with COVID-19 a month or so ago. Unfortunately, her body was not able to recover.
