

From the Pastor ~



In a magazine called *The Presbyterian Outlook* is an article by William Enright, former parish minister and now executive director of the *Lake Institute on Faith and Giving* at the University of Indiana, Indianapolis.

In this article Mr. Enright draws some conclusions from the 2013 Congregational Economic Impact Study. This study involved 3100 churches throughout the United States. It was conducted by a number of encouragement and coaching entities — the Lake Institute; The Alban Institute; the Indianapolis Center for Congregations; Maximum Generosity; and the National Association of Church Business Administration.

If the weight of the names is any indication of the weight of the ideas produced, the following culled by Mr. Enright is instructive.

First he notes that he is "impressed by the selfless sense with which clergy and congregations make financial decisions." He sees it that most of the churches put other-service first and give priority to programs designed to meet the needs of church and surrounding community by helping with "utility bills, rent, etc."

He writes that what he calls the "financial psyche" of many congregations is driven by "God will provide!" and a vital and vibrant Have Faith! Trust In God! At the same time he draws a bead on the observation that however well-intentioned, spiritual motivation does not necessarily nurture, as he put it, "financial acumen nor make for financial health."

One church leader said once that facing constant financial turbulence in the church would be, for his final assessment, his judgment Day, one of the main trials by fire of his earthly life. He also said that this would be in large part due to the fact that he had to deal with so many leaders and so many members and too many pastors who just kept on singing: be not afraid whate'er betide, God will take care of you. That makes a nice sentimental hymn, sayeth he, but it has nothing to do with the down to earth religious grit of the One who would send you out wise as serpents and, as well, loving the Lord with all the mind. Practicality and Spirituality do not stand opposing each other, but go hand in hand. The road to hell can be paved with good spirituality. Along with the good intentions.

Bringing us back to the survey. A couple of the things Mr. Enright drew from as a challenge to pulpit and pew:

- "Let it be': U.S. congregations appear to have a more laissez faire approach to economic issues. In an era in which many are choking in consumer debt, only about a third of the congregations offer programs in personal finance. Amidst the challenges of the Great Recession only four in ten congregations said their clergy began to talk more about faith and giving.
- "Overly Optimistic: Most congregations appear to be overly optimistic as to their financial situation; 74 percent [figures rounded] said that they fared well or very well

- during the recession. However, the financial data they provided did not warrant such unvarnished optimism. Like it or not, the church is a small business and money matters; without it programs are cut, services eliminated, doors shuttered.
- "Clergy Awareness: The majority of American clergy continue to be uninformed as to the giving patterns and financial details of their congregation, supporting the findings of two earlier studies. Does this reflect a leadership issue? From a donor's perspective leadership matters! Philanthropist Laura Arrillaga-Andreessen advises to 'think twice' before funding an organization in which the executive cannot 'tell you what success looks like for that organization.' Leadership guru Patrick Lencioni writes: 'The single biggest factor determining whether an organization is going to get healthier is the genuine commitment and active involvement of the person in charge. For the company that's the CEO ... for a church, it's the pastor."

In the end Mr. Enright tells it that particular churches must show clearly that they are worthy of receiving gifts from members. And you do this, he says, by building trust and transparency that fully informs everyone always about all financial details. As well, donors want to know that their gifts are appreciated and creating lasting change. "What are you doing," he ends it, "to foster a culture of generosity within your congregation or organization?"


YOUTH NEWS-August


Roller Skating at the Lind Arena-Sunday, 11th at 5:00



Take home Bible Study for August — Sabbath: An Acquired Taste

Exercise: Time Log

For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven. Ecclesiastes 3:1

This exercise invites you to identify the *chronos* and *kairos* times in your life. You will need your datebook or calendar to remind you of what has happened over the past year.

Choose a specific time period. Make a list of the major events during that period. This is your chromos list. It is going to be a pretty straight forward accounting of your life during that period.

Now go back and circle or highlight the events in which God was especially present—when you either felt the presence of God or, in retrospect, you now believe God was working... leading you, calling you, molding you. Mark the defining events of this period. This is your *kairos* list.

Note that the *kairos* times are not always experienced as positive. Sometimes they are per-

ceived at the time as being quite negative. The defining element of *kairos* moments is not how we feel about them, then or now, but our understanding that God is active even~ or especially ~in these times.

The real and the spiritual are one, like body and soul in a living person. It is for the law to clear the path; it is for the soul to sense the Spirit. To find Sabbath peace you must keep the Sabbath holy.

After you have established your list, ponder the following questions:

- 1. Is there any pattern to my kairos moments?
- 2. Are they likely to occur in similar circumstances or to be generated by particular kinds of events?

- 3. Do they happen as a result of what you plan or do, or are they seemingly "random"?
- 4. Try to discern whether there are any specific relationships between the kairos and chromos moments of your life. Does there seem to be seem to be some particular "place" God is leading you through your *kairos* moments?

Having pondered your kairos moments, now take a look at the rhythms-or lack of them-of your daily living during that same period. Consider the rhythms of solitude and community, of work and rest, of stillness and action, of silence and word, of engagement and retreat. How do these rhythms inform your living of chronos and kairos time? How do you experience them nurturing~ or draining ~you? What rhythms are missing? Is there a new rhythm to which God is inviting you?

At the point of the turning world... There the dance is... There would be no dance and there is only the dance... The inner freedom from the practical desire, the release from action and suffering, release from the inner andouter compulsion, yet surrounded by a grace of time.
