

Knowing How To Be Rich and How To Be Poor

"I know how to abound and I know how to be abased."
(The Apostle Paul to the Churches at Philippi; Philippians 4:12)

"Now ... Jesus ... asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son Of Man is?' ... 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' ... 'But who do you say that I am?" Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hell will not prevail against it." -- Matthew 16: 13ff

"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Matthew 6: 19ff

Relative to the rest of the world, as if from a great height looking down on the planet spread flat, and with ability to see the material and spiritual wealth of everyone everywhere, someone said that you would see the greatest percentage of such wealth within the boundaries of the Americas and there within the bounds of the United States and there within the Church of Jesus Christ.

The above words of Jesus as The Christ have great existential power and especially at that one supreme moment when Peter was faced with a decision that would forever change his destiny. He had called Jesus *The Christ. He had testified. He made a commitment.* To which Christ told Peter that his testifying commitment was a magnifying obsession and in no way a strictly human assessment: "Blessed art thou, Simon Son of Jonah," blessed to have the power of the very Force of all creating break in upon your heart and soul and mind and might. Blessed to have driving within you a transforming faith, a new life hope. And on the strength of your confession, and for that matter any such confession anytime, anywhere, a church will be born and a church will be built and the very gates of hell will not contain or keep out the prevailing, transforming strength of that church.

Words of great power.

And not with any less power are His words of treasure. Note that treasure is not denounced, decried or diminished. It's an investment. Expecting return on investment. But what it is, and the wealth of it -- it's where you store it that defines it. There in Scripture and beyond, historical testimony to the magnificence of a new "heart" treasure that comes from the liberating, gate-breaking, Truth-setting-free engagement of life only found within Christ's Church. Blessed are you.

The Word, then, creating a Church against which those hell gates will not hold is what made The Apostle Paul thankful for the generosity of the churches in Philippi. And he wrote to them the following, "Not that I speak in respect of want: for I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content. I know both how to be abased, and I know how to abound: every where and in all things I am instructed both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need. I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

Those words are worth reading again. "I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have lots. And anywhere I am and whatever it is that I face I have learned the secret of having plenty and the secret of having want. I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

Gate breaking treasure. Blessed are you.

What is the point of the Church? Why work to make it? Why give it anything at all — sense, or time or dollars and cents. For just this reason. Those who are the called to be the church respond to — or deny — an obsession through the Power of the Spirit to make disciples, to teach, to baptize, to make systematic sense of the complex character of Christ, and by making sense meeting needs, the needs of the "least of these," Matthew 25 and Mathew 28, breaking down gates, releasing, setting free, saving.

And we need that now. We need to know just what church The Trinity United Presbyterian Church is and what it will be in the days ahead. What we do now, what we can do as we are so enabled to do it by the grace of God, what we do will determine what we will be.

On the financial end the Trinity church has been running deficits, lately significant deficits, for a number of years. These are daily program expense deficits. And it's not unusual for deficit spending to occur upon the departure of a pastor, during interim periods, so on. Transitional times are unilaterally challenging times. But also new life times.

Daily program expenses are not extraordinary "crisis" expenditures. A new furnace is, or a parking lot resurfacing, or musical instrument replacement. Daily expense is staff compensation, utilities, education, the day-in day-out maintenance of the sacred place and its mission – gate-breaking expenses.

This is the time of year that our church considers such things and you will be receiving correspondence from leaders and it is my suggestion that we look hard and long to see what we can do, what we're empowered to do, what heart-transforming investment we might make. The leaders of our church need to look at what the church is spending and why, and is it being the best steward of its resources given by you who give with such dedication and determination. And likewise the members — all of us—need to look at what we're giving and why, and are we being the best stewards of the grace by which we've been empowered and sustained.

Washington Gladden served the First Congregational Church in Columbus, Ohio. He once gave, on two successive Sundays, some sermonic thoughts about *Knowing How To Be Poor* and *Knowing How To Be Rich*. And when he thought with his church about how to be rich, he had one particularly lyrical passage that resounds with treasure storing and gate breaking, which I would like to include here:

It is commonplace to say that the one who knows how to abound must be one who knows how to make his abundance tributary to the welfare of his fellow men and women. ... The gift without the giver is always bare, and may be baneful. But money can be made to serve if wisdom and love go with it, and this is the great problem of the man or woman of wealth — to find ways of dispensing his benefactions so that they shall express a true wisdom and a genuine goodwill. ... a difficult but not an impossible task, and the one who works it out becomes the heir of many beatitudes. It is a great thing to have — such power as is concentrated in large wealth — and to know what it

is for and how to use it. What a happy one must he or she be who is able to turn the streams of abundance into the channels of life; to give health to the sick, and comfort to the careworn; to send light into darkened homes; to clear the paths of opportunity before those who are hedged in by poverty and ignorance, and lift up the beacon of hope before their eyes; to replenish the torch of the lightbearers and strengthen the hearts of those who are working to fill the earth with the beauty of the Lord. In all our communities we have such men and women, and their works will follow them."

"Treasure," and "the gates of hell unable to contain" — these are elements of the Word, the rock of Christ's Church. And relative to the rest of the world we have a chance to be numbered among, ultimately, those unique ones, "such men and women, and their works will follow them."

Grace and Peace and Joy in this Christmas time.

Weekly, monthly or other regular giving.

Lump-sum toward year-end deficit reduction.

Designated giving to particular mission causes.

Endowment giving, such as in designating interest only to be used for ongoing day-to-day ministry and mission.

Endowment giving designating interest and/or principal to be used for a particular need.

Gifting of stocks or bonds to the church with instructions to liquidate upon receipt and use funds as indicated. Upon the advice of an accountant it may be tax-advantageous to give stocks or bonds to a church as opposed to selling and distributing proceeds.


The meeting was adjourned and closed with prayer at 1:05PM by Rev. Dennis Allison, Moderator.

CHRISTMAS CAROLING





The bake sale money went to the "Angel Tree." The Youth have "adopted" 3 children of the tree.


