"Gifted Christians" Dr. Jim Schumacher

Within the fellowship of Christ, the New Testament reminds us, all of us are "gifted Christians." Does that make sense for you? Do you feel that as a result of the Spirit, working through baptism and the Word, you have received special gifts from God? Our first inclination is to say, "Absolutely not! I'm just a run-of-the-mill Christian." Prudence teaches us not to volunteer for anything. Many learned that during military service. Being Johnny-on-the-Spot frequently proves difficult and dangerous.

The truth, however, is that all of us are "gifted Christians." Some have the ability to speak and teach. An impressively large number have musical gifts. A lot, but not all of them, are currently in our choir. I know this, because I now spend plenty of time sitting out there in our pews.

One of many ways that I realize just how gifted this congregation really is comes from what, to me, is a truly unique experience. For the first time in my life, I get to sit in a pew with Sally and worship my way through a pastoral vacancy. Previously, I was either the dirty bird who caused the vacancy, or the remarkably talented person who had just ended a pastoral vacancy. What I've discovered is how well we work together as a congregation to keep the life of our church working.

I've been particularly impressed by those of you serving as liturgists. Really, you do just as well as many of us who've served as associate pastors! This really is one of the Spirit's gifts. When it's done well, public speaking seems as natural as falling off a log. Truth is, however, there are plenty of those around us who would just as soon face a firing squad! Our liturgists use their special gifts to enrich each and every service.

Our Christian Education program continues a faithful and effective ministry, training adults and children. I'm not always sure that all of us appreciate just how vital the work of our Sunday School really is.

Our public schools need to practice religious neutrality, not favoring any particular tradition. Where else will children, men and women, learn the basic facts of Christian faith? Time Magazine observed in a 2007 cover story that only half of US adults could name even one of the four Gospels. Fewer than half could recognize Genesis as the Bible's first book. The church is the only place where that kind of instruction happens, except, perhaps, in higher education. All of that notwithstanding, the Bible and church history remain an important part of our cultural heritage!

The next time you hear a young person refer to Jesus, the Bible, or the church, thank a Sunday School teacher! Christian education isn't just what happens during the Church School's hour. Trinity's youth fellowship provides the social expression for our older students.

All who teach and administer this program offer a vital service both to our congregation and community.

I was really touched on learning that many of our elders have actually taken the training and are now administering home communion to our shut-ins. The fact that our presbytery offers special training for ordained elders, permitting them to provide what, otherwise, would be a pastoral responsibility, is a real help for our church particularly during this interim period.

Our Presbyterian system of church government offers support that's often overlooked. Our Session provides over-all guidance and supervision just as it would even if our new pastor were already in our pulpit. Presbytery provides a moderator chosen among its membership so that pastoral input always is available. While all of that goes on, our deacons continue their vital ministries both within our congregation and in our wider community.

Sally and I have "looked at clouds from both sides now." We've had the privilege of serving as your pastor and pastor's wife. Now, returning, we've also had the experience of sitting in our pews, being inspired by our music and our services. We're more than thrilled to see the many ways in which our congregation has learned to carry on the ministry of the church -- even during a time of "pastoral absence." As we wait for our next minister, we remain comforted that our Lord remains a constant presence through the Spirit's power. God really does need each one of us as, together, we serve him in and through our church.

Moderators Report: The following is the moderator's report to Session. Rev. Millspaugh will not serve as our moderator in 2013 due to health reasons. He is glad to see young life in the congregation and enjoyed the children's Christmas program this morning.

Deacon Report: Minutes received.

Presbytery: Arlene and Rev. Millspaugh attended the meeting at College Drive in New Concord. The following are items of interest from the meeting:

Report of Administrative Commission for Gracious Dismissal was presented to address the

requests of churches to be dismissed from PC(USA).

\$750 was awarded to Mary Perone for the 2 Cents a Meal grant. Budget - \$1.50 increase to the Presbytery portion of per Capita was passed, bringing per Capita to \$28.48. The Committee On Ministry approved Alex Barnes for ministry. The new Moderator is Rev. Jon Carlisle.

Old Business: A motion was made to retroactively approve Jan Jenkins as Elder. Approved. Elder Mennega provided an update on the Natural gas pricing. His recommendation is to stay with Columbia. He is still checking on the best electric deal.

Worship and Music Report: No action items. We served Holy Communion to 108 on

Sunday, December 2, 2012. The next communion service will be on January 6, 2013. The Christmas eve service will start with the music at 7pm, worship at 7:30pm. Fredrick Frank, teacher at the New Concord Middle School will deliver the message.

The proposed budget approved by committee is the same as the 2012 budget.

The committee is considering the possibility of having Troy Lewis of Toledo, Ohio, as a possible speaker. He is the author of 'Another Second Chance', a story of his life experiences when he and his brother were each in need kidney transplants. The church would be asked to provide one night's motel stay and asks only for a love offering and provision for a book stand.

Outreach: No report.

Christian Education: No report.

Personnel: No Report

Nominating & Membership: No action items. The slate of officers for 2013 has been approved.

Finance: The monthly finance report was presented. The balance figure for November was positive. Elder Sidwell reported that a second stewardship mailing was sent and received good response. 59 pledging units have now pledged. This is a lower number of pledging units than last year, but we are only about \$8,000 less than pledged last year. The committee will continue to contact members who have yet to pledge. The next task is to finish our mission giving. Reminder to committee chairs to turn in any outstanding committee budget proposals.

Building and Grounds: More lights have burned out in the sanctuary. The committee received note from a member of the congregation about leaving the curtain to the parlor open slightly. Motion was made to leave the curtain open. Approved, with one dissenting vote.

Missions: Reported with no action items. The committee continues to look at providing some kind of anti-bullying program. Between \$1,200 – \$1,300 was raised for Souper Bowl. This will be divided 5 ways for community.

Youth Committee: Reported with no action items. Raised \$369 from cookie sale. Spent \$200 on each child for Christmas Angel program. 10 youth were involved and the youth also participated in the hanging of greens. On January 6, 2013 we will take down the Christmas decorations. The next youth meeting is scheduled for January 13, 2013.

New Business: Rev. Mary Jane Knapp has requested we move our meeting time to 1PM. She will be coming from New Concord after their service concludes. Approved.

A proposed communion schedule was presented. Approved.

A motion was made to set date for installation/ordination of officers as January 20, 2013, and communion on the January 6, 2013. Approved.

Motion was made to set the date of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation for January 20, 2013. Approved.

Recommendation to have an AED training class to have members educated in its use. This will be directed to the appropriate committee.

A little note from Amanda about Mardi Gras

Mardi Gras evolved from the frugal nature of the devout French Catholics that settled much of Louisiana. "Fat Tuesday" was a day used to eat up sugary sweets, butter and meats before the Lenten period began. Gumbo was a popular method of combining odds and ends of meats, fish, and vegetables and King Cake, pralines, beignets and other baked goods allowed a chance for one last good feast before Lenten fasting. Growing up in Louisiana every student participated in Lenten fasting in much the same way a northern teacher would have children write a New Year's resolution. Every classroom ate weekly king cakes and every building was festooned with purple, green and gold. Just like northern churches celebrate Fat Tuesday with pancake breakfasts, all Southern Louisiana churches celebrate Mardi Gras and for the same reasons; to share joy, to have fellowship, and to appreciate the blessings that God has given us.

I know a lot of folks at the church have wondered why we have started celebrating Fat Tuesday/ Mardi Gras. Mardi Gras is not the bacchanalian free-for-all that is portrayed on much of the TV. The news almost always focuses on the craziness of the French Quarter, when in reality the majority of parades and parties are more similar to a typical Zanesville parade... only bigger! This holiday is very dear to my heart because it was also very dear to my mother's heart. As most of you know my mother passed away five years ago. I could easily make a memorial in her

All about Mardi Gras/ Fat Tuesday

While not observed nationally throughout the United States, a number of cities and regions in the country have notable Mardi Gras celebrations. Mardi Gras arrived in North America as a sedate French Catholic tradition with the Le Moyne brothers, Pierre Le Moyne d'Iberville and Jean-Baptiste Le Moyne de Bienville. In the late 17th century, King Louis XI sent the pair to defend France's claim on the territory of Louisiana, which included what are now the



U.S. states of Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana.

The expedition, led by Iberville, entered the mouth of the Mississippi River on the evening of March 2, 1699, "Lundi Gras", not yet knowing it was the river explored and claimed for France by René-Robert Cavelier, Sieur de La Sall in 1683. The party proceeded upstream to a place on the west bank about 60 miles downriver from where New Orleans is today, where a small tributary emptied into the great river, and made camp. This was on March 3, 1699, Mardi Gras day. In honor of this holiday, Iberville named the spot Point du Mardi Gras (French: "Mardi Gras Point") and called the

small tributary Bayou Mardi Gras. Bienville went on to found the settlement of Mobile, Alabama in 1702 as the first capital of French Louisiana, and in 1703 the Mardi Gras tradition began with celebrations by the French settlers in that city. By 1720, Biloxi had been made capital of Louisiana. The French customs were introduced there at that time. In 1723, the capital of Louisiana was moved to New Orleans, founded in 1718. The tradition there expanded to the point that it became synonymous with that city, and closely associated with the slogan "Laissez les bon temps rouler" (French "Let the good times roll").

A little bit about King Cake...

As part of our Christian faith, the coming of the wise men bearing gifts to the Christ Child is celebrated twelve days after Christmas. We refer to this as the Feast of the Epiphany or Little Christmas on the Twelfth Night. This is a time of celebration, exchanging gifts and feasting. Today, the tradition continues as people all over the world gather for festive Twelfth Night celebrations. A popular custom was and still is the baking

of a special cake in honor of the three kings called "A King's Cake." Inside every cake is a tiny baby (generally plastic now, but sometimes this baby might be made of porcelain or even gold). The tradition of having King Cake Parties has evolved through time, and the person who receives the slice of cake with the baby is asked to continue the festivities by hosting the next King Cake party.

Originally, King Cakes were a simple ring of dough with a small amount of decoration. Today's King Cakes are much more festive. After the rich Danish dough is braided and baked, the "baby" is inserted. The top of the ring or oval cake is then covered with delicious sugar toppings in the traditional Mardi Gras colors of purple, green and gold. purple represents justice; green, faith; and gold, power.
