We have been enjoying a slower time of no travels these months, as we have been here in Lima, planning for next year's church teams. Though we did travel a bit in September and October, to visit some church partners and learn about their ministries. There are so many rich details about our partners that I would love to share, but it would take me pages to do so. I will try to be brief and share the gems, though.

We first visited the Evangelical Church of Peru (IEP) congregation of Santa Teresa, located in southern Peru, about six hours north of Cusco. It was another curvy road adventure to reach the deep jungle, but beautiful nonetheless. During our visit, we met with the session of the Santa Teresa congregation. They shared with us their faithful commitment to continuing to build up and improve their church structure, in order to better accommodate regional visitors for the frequent assemblies, retreats and conventions that the IEP carries out there, due to its central location. They are also hoping to renovate their Sunday School classrooms. These servants of God are witnesses to the strength and importance of the church's influence in their community. They explained to us the need to go out and not be a 'static church', and stated that "the church that works, needs God's love. We are the salt and the light." Such powerful words from a congregation that trusts that God will accompany them in each step of their mission outreach.

Dear Church,

Happy New Year! And better yet, Happy Epiphany!

Ever since I was in college and first learned about January 6th being the “Feast of the Magi” as it was called then, I’ve been enthralled by the day. Of course, at that time I was more excited about having yet another chance to give and receive presents. Even now I celebrate the day by unwrapping Christmas gifts with my cousin in Nevada via telephone or Face Time!

But over time, this day has become a regular part of how I remember God’s gift of entering human history by revealing God’s self through the very human form of Jesus. And 2020 is a particularly good year to focus our attention on Epiphany as throughout the year we will be hearing Matthew’s gospel in which he tells us the story of the Magi’s visit to the King of Kings.

Can you imagine what was going on in their hearts and minds when they first saw the little one and suddenly realized they had come face to face with God?

Shock and awe may be a phrase we’ve coined to represent a negative response to something fearful, but I really think that the words apply here, too. But instead of the desire to flee something terrible, the Magi were drawn by the star’s light to something – someone – far more incredible! To this day the words of Handel’s Hallelujah Chorus ring in our hearts: “Wonderful, Counsellor, Almighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace!”



And all this revealed in a very, very small package.

Over the coming weeks we will look closely at how God has revealed God’s self through the person of Jesus. We’ll see the Holy Spirit descend upon him in the River Jordan. We’ll hear him bless the crowds gathered on a mountaintop and learn with those gathered about what God wants from people who claim faith in God. Then we’ll look on with Peter, James and John as God’s light – the same light that fired the star so bright - washes over Jesus’ figure to expose him as True God from True God.

Yes, the Season of Epiphany will be filled with glad tidings of great joy, just as the angels promised the shepherds on the night of Jesus' birth! And throughout this season, we'll together witness God revealing God's self to human kind, not just in days of old, but in the here and now, too.

But of course, it will be wintry and cold over January and February... and there may be storms that will make the roads unsafe for travel to Sunday worship – or any other meeting or event when the county is at a level 2 emergency! Please don't fret if you can't personally attend church because of bad weather. I plan to work with the webmaster so we can at least post the sermon and some prayers on our website if worship is cancelled.

So, there it is: a preview of not just the months to come, but of a season to be celebrated, a time when hopefully, we will be like the wise men and filled with shock and awe when we see God revealed through Jesus our Lord.

“Something Old, Something New”

No sooner does Advent give way to Christmas, than someone’s yelling, “Happy New Year!” Really? Personally, I just got used to 2019! I wish I could say I’ve mastered last year but, ready or not, here comes a whole, new year!

As a pastor, you’d probably assume I’d be pondering something biblical and profound. Instead, I’m thinking of a rhyme that, really, belongs to weddings: “Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue.” Think how many brides adjust their wardrobes, remembering that poetic advice! Strangely, though, it fits the beginning of a new year perfectly. We add our memories of what is old to the new opportunities that come with New Year’s Day. It’s inevitable we would bring something borrowed, because everything we have is God’s gift to us. Something blue? Perhaps you can help me with that one!

NOW, I’ll don my preacher’s hat!

Consider how many times the word, “new” appears in scripture. Genesis begins with God’s Creation. Theologians insist God created the universe, “ex nihilo” (out of nothing). By that, they mean that Creation’s not the same as recycling! Everything we can see, feel, touch, or know about comes from God’s creation. In that sense, Creation, at the beginning, is REALLY new!

As Christians, the term “new” is crucially important! Unlike Jews, we divide scripture into the Old Testament and the New Testament. (In all fairness, the prophet Jeremiah coined the term before the coming of our Lord.):

Jeremiah 31:31–34 (NRSV): ³¹ The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ³² It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the Lord. ³³ But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the Lord: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. ³⁴ No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, “Know the Lord,” for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the Lord; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

What we call the New Testament (or, if you will, the “New Covenant”) continues to speak of a “New creation,” a “new heaven” a “new earth,”. And even a new human being:

2 Corinthians 5:17–19 (NRSV): ¹⁷ So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! ¹⁸ All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; ¹⁹ that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us.

What was it about the Gospel of our Lord that was so appealing that it quite literally transformed not only the ancient world, but our own time as well? Let me suggest, it was not what was old, but what new. A new year challenges us to make the world around us to resemble the “new heaven” and the “new earth” Paul had in mind.

In his Philippians Letter, Paul presents all of this as a challenge:

Philippians 3:13–14 (NRSV): ¹³this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

We find ourselves leaving the old year with a certain reluctance. While not everything worked as we wished it might have, we understood what was going on. That’s the trouble with 2020! Thanks to the coming leap year we now have 366 days before us. The real question is, how will we use them? For himself, Paul has his own answer, “Forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

That, my friends, is a high calling! That’s the highest of all callings ever! As members of Christ’s Church, as members of Trinity United Presbyterian Church, we follow Christ into 2020 with Christ present to us through the Holy Spirit. We follow with Paul as our scriptural coach, urging us, calling each of us, to do our very best to make our new world more like the Heavenly New Kingdom prepared for us by the God who loves us!

Peru-Presbyterian Partnership—Continued from Page 1 –

Our next travel took us to Huánaco in central Peru. Here we visited an initiative that works for the mutual benefit of two partner institutions of the Peruvian Joining Hands Network. The first institution is an ecological farm, Granja Lindero, which prides itself on a sustainable development model and a mission focused on the environment, justice and non-violence. The Director, José, gave us a tour of the farm, sharing their current work of an organic garden, composting and a small milk/cheese factory, all for the benefit of the surrounding community. José is a big dreamer and hopes to amplify the garden, build a greenhouse and also include ramps for handicap access. It was difficult not to get excited about the mission through his energy!

The farm was created in 2006, with the sole purpose of generating funds for the second institution, La Casa del Buen Trato (House of Good Treatment). La Casa houses girls and women who have been sexually abused by family members and need a temporary and safe place to live to physically and emotionally recover. La Casa not only offers protection, but works with the girls on their school education and provides psychological and spiritual support. La Casa is private and is only financed by donations from churches and non-government institutions. They accompany the girls through their vulnerability, while also advocating for them for domestic violence issues, in general, at the local and national level.

Some of the older girls help out at the farm, in order to learn about job responsibility and experience eco-therapy while working with the farm animals. All of this is with the pure mission of mutual benefit for all involved.

It was a difficult visit at times, listening to the stories of the girls and their struggles. But the commitment of those working on the farm and at the Casa gave us hope for the girls' future, what they would learn through their time on the farm and how that knowledge of ecological justice and sustainable development could move them to make a difference in the next stage of their life journeys.

Your support allows us to accompany these partners on their individual and joint mission in Huánaco and beyond. Thank you for walking with us and for your openness to learn about the joys and challenges of our partners and their hopes and dreams for a better and just future.

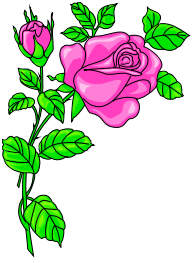
May we walk Jesus' way of justice and love this Christmas season and into the New Year.
