Dear Church,

Christina Rosetti's poem first appeared in *Scribner's Monthly* in January, 1872:

In the Bleak Mid-Winter Frosty wind made moan, Earth stood hard as iron, Water like a stone...



My mind is wandering as I write this Pondering. It is still cold, bleak, early December and the Advent and Christmas hub-bub – such as it is - are blanketing me in a frost laden fog. Daylight continues on its descent to winter's solstice and January, 2021 seems as far away as does January, 1872.

Yet by the time you read this, you'll be able to say, "I survived the surreal existence that was 2020."

But was that all 2020 was: an unimaginable existence?

Scripture is replete with images of a simpler, more agrarian way of life:

- A dove returns to the Ark with a simple olive branch in its beak. (Genesis)

- Deserts rejoice and blossom (Isaiah 35)
- Abundant crops come by strength of the ox (Proverbs 14)
- Figs are not gathered from thorns (Luke 6)
- Choice flour and wheat, cattle and sheep (Revelation 18)




Such simple gifts of life did not fade from view in 2020. They blessed us with the familiar: Fruit trees still bore fruit. Rain fell and crops were harvested so people could eat...

Not that everyone was filled. Production was sometimes uneven. Supplies were sometimes back ordered.

Yet God spoke to our hearts and Trinity members responded by:

- Gathering up toiletries and mittens for people in need.
- Writing notes and phoning friends who needed to remain away from the public.
- Fixing soups to be given to those who underwent surgeries or became ill.
- Taking on the extra chores at the church building or sewed masks so that people could safely worship.
- Figuring out how to use technology with which to share the comforts of music with the world.




Like doves and figs, the members of this congregation fulfilled God's ordinary, extraordinary purpose in 2020 and did not fade from view.

Yet now we face the frosty winds and iron hard earth of January. And while there is at least one vaccine being administered to help bodies stave off this virus that has plagued us since last March... the water of life is still like stone - not yet gushing from rocks.

That said, I firmly believe that in God's good time the ice of mid-winter – and this pandemic - will melt and life will begin to feel a bit more natural, even if not "normal."

I also believe that, just as in 2020, God is still calling each of us to service. We are to be the bearers of the hope, peace, joy, and love that is Jesus Christ - so that everyone we meet might experience the wonder of these blessings.

To offer such gifts will take spiritual strength, strength developed through the discipline of prayer.



So, I offer to you a prayer for the New Year. I can't claim its composition. I came across it while sifting through some of my mother's old *Guideposts* magazines. It was written in 1973 – one hundred and one years after Christina Rosetti wrote her poem and forty-eight years before now. It's interesting how these "old" writings still speak to us today! May this prayer warm your heart and bless you as you begin each of the 365 days ahead.

Prayer for a Happy New Year

May the Lord make my New Year a happy one...

Not by shielding me from sorrow and pain, but by strengthening me to bear it if it comes.

Not by making my path easy, but by making me sturdy enough to tread any path.

Not by taking hardship from me, but by taking all cowardice and fear from my heart as I meet hardships.

Not by granting me unbroken sunshine, but by keeping my face bright even in the shadows.

Not by making my life always pleasant, but by showing me where men and His cause need me most and by making me zealous to be there and to help ...

God, make my year a happy one.

"New Day Dawning" Dr. Jim Schumacher

The year 2020 experienced what could most gently be described as "bad press"! Small wonder! Today's children will tell Corona virus stories to future generations!

"Why, I remember when your grandmother and I had to wear a mask buying groceries!"

"It felt like we were robbing a 7/11 store!"

"What's a 7/11 store?"

"Just let me tell you! You've got a lot to learn!"

That will be the upside! Hospitals filled to overflowing; hundreds of thousands dead and dying. Churches closed, making do with on-line services. Schools closed, with their students glued to computers, doing the best they could against great odds. What a story!

Corona's just one of so many other issues! The greatest country on our planet divided over issues of race, violence, and immigration. An election so vitriolic some family members stopped speaking! No wonder we're hurried moving on to 2021!

There have, of course, been other years with similar, but different problems.

Take 1968 as an example. I vividly recall driving the Dan Ryan Express Way in Chicago. Thick, black smoke billowed up from buildings burning on either side of the freeway. It was early morning. I hadn't yet seen the news. When I got to seminary, I learned Martin Luther King, Jr. had been assassinated! That was a time to mourn. Back then, America was — again — in another struggle marked by race and blood. Nor was that the end! In months, another Kennedy would be killed — this time Robert Kennedy — as he candidates for the presidency. In Chicago, that year, Norman Lincoln Rockwell paraded through Skokie, Illinois with his American Nazi party. Talk about a year! My family wanted to know if we ought to dig a fallout shelter, protecting us against a Soviet attack!

While all of that was going on, I preached what was either my best, or the worst of all the sermons I ever delivered. As I recall, I titled it, "A Long Day's Journey into Light." The outline was simple (at least that's what I thought). I began describing how awful the year had been. The second part of that sermon talked about the strength Christian faith provides and the great things ahead. When I stop to think about it, our American space program was really gearing up. Our astronauts had circumnavigated the moon. Within a year, Americans would set foot on the lunar surface. BUT!! Before I could get to the more optimistic part of that meditation, one of my church members dramatically rose from his pew, opining, "We don't need preachers telling us how bad things are!! And, with that, he and his family stomped out of our building!

After the service, I hurried to my parishioners' home. Fortunately, I had a complete manuscript of the service to share with them. After a fair amount of verbal jousting, it was generally agreed that in order to see a great light, sometimes you also need to talk about shadows. And that's where we left it.

I'm not sure every preacher really needs moments like that. I really can't say I enjoyed it very much at the time. On the other hand, it did get me ready for 2020!

Maybe now we're ready for the light! Several vaccines are on the way and — in a matter of months — will be ready. What a difference that will surely make.

As a ten-year-old, Mom and Dad told me my little brother was diagnosed with polio. I didn't understand the real danger at the time. I do remember Dick wound up in Cleveland's Metro General Hospital for months. Not only did he survive, but lived to become one of Indianapolis's best heart specialists. Against that background, then, you'll understand how much Jonas Salk's development of his anti-polio vaccine meant to our family back then. Much the same will be true for all of us as these new immunizations are administered.

Indeed, there IS light at the end of this tunnel.

Still, in order for that to work, we need our faith, don't we? When the day seems darkest, that's when we need our trust in God. God did not give us a spirit of despair. Indeed, the opening part of our Christian bible is called "the Gospels." Gospels, ("Euangellion" in Greek), is the announcement of good news. In particular, the gospel is the announcement that Jesus' life, death, and resurrection have brought about salvation for Israel and the world.

We get so wrapped up in our particular pains that we miss God's big picture. John's Gospel starts by insisting that God so loved the world that God gave God's only begotten Son so that those who believe in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. (John 3:16). To be a follower of Christ is to believe that is not only true for us, but for the whole of God's people in all time and every place.

The Good News is, God's not through with us. The Lord remains our strength and our shield. Paul would write,

Romans 8:37–39 (NRSV): ³⁷ In all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸ For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹ nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

The year 2020 was not the year of our dreams. Years ago, American playwright Eugene O'Neil published a partly autobiographical plan about the darkness of addiction and the loss of hope. O'Neil titled his work, "A Long Day's Journey into Night." Long ago, I meditated on the darkness of his vision in my sermon. Then, as now, I believe ours is in very fact not a journey into darkness but rather into light. In this regard, I base that hope on some important lines from St. John's retelling of the Gospel of our Lord:

John 1:1–5 (NRSV): ¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

Dear Church,

Several weeks ago, a call from Muskingum Valley's Presbytery nominating committee caught me very off guard. They asked me to stand for election to the post of 2021 Vice Moderator and then stand for election in 2022 to the Moderator's role.

After much prayerful consideration, I polled the session members to determine what pros and cons they saw. Surprisingly, the majority were comfortable with the idea that I take this volunteer work on. With their thoughts in mind, I agreed to serve.

It is very important you to know that because I firmly believe my first and topmost responsibilities are to you, the people of TUPC, if I find I cannot fulfill the duties to the presbytery I will step down from the Moderator's role.

Though we are all called to serve the church, I am very surprised I was asked to serve in this way. I'm still fairly new to this presbytery. However, the committee felt I had enough presbytery experience in other jurisdictions to prepare me for the work. They also told me that in addition to the four general presbytery meetings I now attend each year, I would attend six council meetings and share in the Moderator's duties in installations and ordinations of pastors here.

Trinity Serves Our Local and Global Neighbors

SOUPer Bowl—The proceeds of the 2020 "No Show" SOUPer Bowl were divided among Eastside Community Ministry, Christ's Table, The Fellowship of Christ's Community, Muskingum County Center for Seniors, and the Salvation Army. With the sale of "No Show" tickets and church and corporate sponsorship and donations, \$11,350.00 was collected. In addition, approximately \$3,000 worth of canned goods were collected in churches or dropped off at Secrest the day of the "No Show" SOUPer Bowl, giving a total of monetary and food donations of \$14,350.00.

Thanksgiving Offering—We collected \$640.00 in our Thanksgiving Offering for Children in Peru. This was split between the House of God Presbyterian Church in Lima, which used their portion to purchase Christmas gifts for the children and food for their families, and The School for the Children who are Deaf (in the jungle area of Moyobamba). With this letter, I would like to thank each of you for your love and generosity. Maggie received an email from the administrative assistant at Genesis Hospice telling us the staff members were loving the snack boxes we brought and that they were gobbling the treats up.
