A Lenten Easter Self-Check – Implication of Incarnation D. Allison

But someone has testified somewhere, "What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them? You have made them for a little while lower than the angels; you have crowned them with glory and honor, subjecting all things under their feet." Now in subjecting all things to them, God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

- Hebrews 2

Reading history there are some things immensely outstanding, examples of goodness seeming to defy human capacity and reasoning. Paul makes such a point when he says, Romans 5, verses six, seven and eight, Christ died for the ungodly [us] while we were still weak Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were yet sinners, for us Christ died!

Once some time ago a student back for a holiday told the minister about a class he was taking. The professor had challenged the class. He said something like what follows. "I want you all to do a reasoning self-check. I want you to ask yourselves, if, as the Christian Bible says, God is omnipotent (all powerful) and omniscient (all knowing) and omnipresent (present everywhere, every moment) as the Christians say God is, then how can God be Good – as the Christians say God is – because … look at all the **bad** things God does or at least allows. It wouldn't *have* to be that way in true all-powerfulness.

That's what he wanted them to come up with. The only answer you can get from the Bible. That God is bad. Any other answer would make it that Christians are non-rational.

It's an old question and an old answer, nothing new. It wasn't the first time the student, an active church member, heard it. He'd participated in discussions, studies, groups for kids, worship. The ministers talked regularly about it. That was because in their experience it came up all the time, subtly, overtly, and not just in the schools, but in movies, TV shows.

Switch now to the present. In our own church on the pastor's shelves when I arrived, were some books left behind by, I would assume, former ministers or interims. A couple of these books were said to be, by the *New York Times*, "best sellers." They were written by a man with an Ivy League pedigree. He's now a professor down South teaching Christian church literature. He was once, he says, a strong and evangelical Christian. Now he says he's atheist.

I understand him to define "God" as a human transcending power, a force, beyond all power and force, space and time. But there is no such God for him. He's an atheist now. Why now an atheist? It is, he wrote, because of all the suffering in the world, and therefore this Christian God can't be good and therefore there is no God. (Of course, by that logic there *could* be a God, he just wouldn't be a good God, but a bad God.)

Now shift back to the student mentioned at the beginning. Questions and comments in discussion were allowed in his class. A minister suggested that he politely ask the professor to comment on the idea that – *from the Bible* -- there is a Good God, yes, but a Good God at war, and in war the good God is not *absolutely* at this moment all-powerful. Since we're referencing the Judeo-Christian story, it's just like God's Son, His Son representing Him, acting in His Power, as the story has it, the story of the Bible, His Son wasn't always "omnipotent." Ask the teacher about that.

The student took it to the class. The student gave examples of times the Son wasn't all-powerful. Examples of the times He did not get His will and His way in the New Testament. Also times that the Father wasn't all-powerful getting His will and His way in the Old Testament. The professor said they'd get to that later. But they didn't.

When the Church is being the Church it systematically presents the implications of the Incarnation. Incarnation means God in mankind. It means God in Christ. It means God not as an abstract consideration of Good or Evil, but as a concrete new life, new life experienced, experienced by us, the kind Paul the Apostle experienced, with a new force of purpose and a new understanding of Divine omnipotence and omnipresence and omniscience.

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Romans 8

I think the professor's suggestion of rationality self-check was most pertinent in the religious, political, and social climate of the time of that student. It's to the point now. Having been called, convicted, and convinced: "How determined am I to be a presence, a force, my personality, my work, wherever I find myself whatever I'm doing -- how determined am I to follow Jesus Christ of Scripture fighting the good fight and keeping the faith in this moment at this time so that the very Good of the very God can triumph in the end over all that's very bad?"

We don't have everything in the Good in subjection to us yet. But we see Jesus who even so did an immensely good thing.

Tri-Giving—The recipient of the Tri-Giving offering for January-April is **The Fellowship of Christ's Community**, the outreach ministry of Central Presbyterian Church, which offers a Sunday meal, a Learning for Life Class, and a worship service after the meal.

Our September-December Tri-Giving offering for Bethel Community Center totaled \$236.46.

One Great Hour of Sharing Offering—This PC (USA) offering provides relief to those affected by natural disasters, provides food to the hungry, and helps to empower the poor and oppressed. One Great Hour of Sharing helps those in need in the United States and around the world. The One Great Hour of Sharing Offering will be collected from March 10th--April 21st. Christmas Joy PC (USA) Offering—We collected \$188.00 in our Christmas Joy Offering during Advent.

YoungLives—We support the Zanesville YoungLives, a mentoring program for teen mothers, through our annual budget. Cheryl Reed is the director, and this is an excerpt from her recent newsletter. This may give some idea of what YoungLives is about.

"Fall 2018 started out strong. We came into school after a great week at camp. We took 3 teen moms, 3 babies, 1 Jr. Leader, and 3 mentors to camp. Two of our teen moms made the decision to follow Jesus and our Jr. Leader took ownership of her faith and grew in leadership. In September we added 2 mentors to our team. We have had strong attendance every week. I am seeing our team connect well with teen moms. Some of our girls come not for the food or games, but because they want to spend time with a specific mentor. We average 7 teen moms at each of our events. Twice a month I visit the parenting class at Foxfire High School. I would like to tell you about Lucy (not her real name). Lucy has a quiet way about her. She almost whispers her comments to me during our parenting class. During one discussion she said that she wants to be a mom who loves her daughter unconditionally and not just to "get stuff" from her. Lucy sees her own mother as a constant demand to give more. Many of our teen moms live in families that survive day to day and 'scavenge' resources from wherever and whomever they can. Lucy has NOT come to YoungLives yet. Pray that God would present opportunities for me to share the UNCONDITIONAL love of Jesus and God our Father to Lucy."
