God and Country Doctors

“Faithful in a very Little, Faithful also in Much”

Luke 16:10

Lent and Easter Pastor Letter

March/April 2018

Routine, by virtue of its regular repetition, is sometimes thought of as being a little thing. But faithful in the daily routine, something “little,” can be something large. Christ in the text from Luke places individual well-being in the large. The *Wall Street Journal* on February 9th ran an essay by Bob Greene: *A Country Doctor Can't Forget His 40 Years of House Calls*. It is about Dr. Charles Kemper. Dr. Kemper is retired. He is 98 years old. He lives in Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin, population 14,000. As compared to, say, New York or Chicago, Chippewa Falls is little. According to the story you could say Dr. Kemper placed many others' well-being at town center. In that way he enlarged that town, his very presence.

Dr. Kemper was a general practitioner, a family physician, from the 1940s to the 1980s. Some of those general physicians regularly made house calls back in the day. He made house calls. He is quoted saying, “It was never a nuisance.”

Mr. Greene, telling the doctor's story, brings up the current state of medical care evolution, its changes -- insurance changes, costs changes, technology advances. He says that the “number of doctors now who remember when house calls were common is shrinking fast.”

Mr. Greene says that health care was once “life size: a doctor you knew, a doctor who would drive his car to your house if you said you needed him.” Life size sounds to me like a little thing. It sounds comfortable and routine. Put “faithful” in that routine of a day life size. A little thing becomes now something grand.

Driving his car to your house if you needed him was not a “once-in-a-while” for Dr. Kemper. But it was basic to his practice, basic to his method. Sick patients, very sick, instead of being required to leave their homes and beds to come to him, he went to them.

Dr. Kemper said, “You could tell in a glance, when you arrived at a home, how serious the situation was. And then my attitude was, time to get to work. Let's get you the help you need. I saw myself as a country doctor.” Country doctor sounds to some like a little thing. However, the way he did his country doctoring, that made it large.

He is mightily impressed by the technology today he says. All the medical specialties, the progression forward. Back then, he said, “If someone was calling at 3 a.m., I didn't have to ask them if it was an emergency. They wouldn't be calling me if it wasn't. I was out of bed and out of the house within 10 minutes. I didn't waste time asking if they thought it could wait until morning. Of course it couldn't. They needed me there, and they needed me now.” Routine daily, a little thing for him, then; and because he was faithful in his calling it's looming large then and now.

He talks about reward in the present tense. “Every day, still, when I'm walking around town, people come up to me. They thank me. They say, ‘You delivered all of our children, and now I'm a great-grandparent.’”

Sometimes because of the so-many patients he dealt with he doesn't recognize them when they greet him today. And when these former patients thank him, he will say back to them, “You're looking good.” He says he doesn't know if they realize it or not, but they are making his day.

It *is* a new day. Medical care now is more corporate, more collective. Something is happening now, has been over the last several decades, comparable to the way Southern farms and plantations became corporations, following the North, after the Civil War, the economy transfiguring. Today private medical practitioners are being swallowed up, some report. Can't afford to be anything but, some say.

Dr. Kemper said that the corporate groups have strict guidelines concerning the amount of time doctors are allowed for each patient, and also how much to charge. So you have a doctor driving a good portion of the hour to visit an "anxious patient's home"? That would be way beneath levels of acceptance in cost and effectiveness now, he says.

Mr. Greene concluded his article by asking Dr. Kemper "why he thought it was that he spent all those days and nights – all those years – driving to the homes of the ailing people who were waiting for him."

"That's why God puts a country doctor on Earth," the doctor said.

Faithful in his calling, individual well-being the routine of his day, something little that became for him, through him, something large, the legacy of this particular country doctor.

So today, and in the changes seeking betterment for many, because of the changes, because of the technology, the progression, doctors even so can still give personalized attention, individual well-being the goal, the routine of this day its own something little becoming something large.

Jesus as the Christ in New Testament times ushering in major change. Corporate changing, Judeo to Judeo/Christian corporate changing. Jesus in his change, faithful in the process, keeping in mind the goal of the advance: to meet every individual regardless when, where or how, as an individual. *"And then my attitude was, time to get to work. Let's get you the help you need."*

As someone else said once about The Great Physician, "We recall that he had an incidental conversation with a woman of Samaria at a well-side, that a man named Nicodemus one evening came to call upon him, that he visited Mary and Martha in their home, that Zacchaeus once invited him to dinner, that blind Bartimaeus called to him from the roadside, that he laid his hands on little children and took them in his arms. When one stops to think of it, what we chiefly remember about Jesus is astounding – commonplace, ordinary, everyday living lifted up and made to illustrate the ideas, attitudes, and principles that alone can redeem the world. His whole life is a commentary on his own words: 'He that is faithful in a very little is faithful also in very much.'"

Regardless technological and systemic progression, there will always be a "very little." The method for any of us "country doctors" may change. But our manner may not.

Below is the latest news update from Bethel which describes the ways the center is trying to prepare young people to be successful in life.

Connecting Effort to Payoff

The Bethel Bucks Opportunity

A focus of Bethel is to equip children and youth to be successful in life and in the workplace. We believe that happens when early on in life they learn the connection between effort and payoff. We have Bethel Bucks as an empowerment strategy to help them to "practice" now many behaviors that will be expected in the workplace. Some examples are showing up on time, proper sign in and sign out, regular attendance, and helping another student, completing the tasks of the day, and doing service projects. Each day they attend After School a volunteer records the Bethel Bucks earned. The last Monday of the month is "payday" when they get to shop the Bethel Shopping Center that has school supplies, craft items, socks, mittens, cap and game with \$10 - \$100 price range. Some kids earn over 200 Bethel Bucks in a month. They are also encouraged to save some every month to put toward "big price items" such as a bicycle. We are proud of the efforts the kids have made and even more proud when we hear they are buying something for a mother, grandmother or brother or sister.

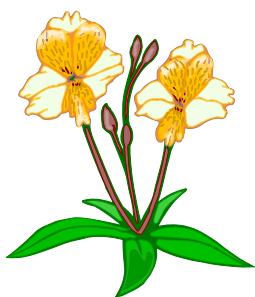
