We of UMAVIDA have a few bits of news for you, both of challenges and strengths.

We sadly said goodbye to our Coordinator, Alejandrina Ibañez, in February, as she decided to resign and use her gifts in other ways. We will miss her organization and encouragement greatly in the office and as a network, but wish her all the best in her future endeavors. As is the case in God's work, when one door closes, another door opens. At the end of March we hired Hivlin Siles to be our new coordinator. Hivlin worked with one of our UMAVIDA partner organizations, so she is familiar with our work, mission and partners. We look forward to working with her and seeing how she can bring new life to our vision and mission.

We held our General Assembly on February 16-17th, where some great discussion was exchanged, as well as some positive ideas on how to move our network forward in the future, including the participation of all partner organizations. Our campaign focus continues to be on water rights and environmental injustice, holding the hope that with greater involvement from more voices we can build a stronger campaign of solidarity together.

In this GA we also voted on a new Board. Though many of the faces didn't change within those elected, their positions did. I am happy to announce that Pastor Emilio Aslla of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bolivia is now our President. Pastor Emilio has been accompanying the network since its foundation in 2001, has held different positions within the Board, and has been a voice of reason and justice amidst many decisions and actions taken throughout these years. I feel strongly that he will be a great asset to the network in this role during our transition.

How Important Is the Truth?

There really are some things we can't live without. Sunlight's really high on my list. Minus the sun, the earth's temperature drops way below zero, plants wither and die. Now that we're about to escape another Ohio winter, all of that defines bad news! And then there's oxygen! When you really can't breathe, it cancels your whole social calendar! How about love? Apart from love and caring, who wants to live anyhow?

Where does truth fit into all of that? Never, until fairly recently, did I ponder truth's centrality in nearly everything we do.

Since time immemorial, courts have depended on truth conveyed by witnesses. The Roman goddess, "Justitia" appears outside many a courthouse -- blinded. In one hand is a sword. In the other is a scale. The balancing of evidence is designed to sift falsehood in the process of finding truth.

Science brings us closer to where we actually live our lives. The technology that enriches all of us comes from scientific research. One advantage that comes with aging is the ability to see the present in the light of the past. Just look around McDonald's or Panera at lunchtime! You're surrounded by smart phones! What would we have thought about such gadgets in the 40s or 50s? My dad, an engineer, might have predicted something similar. He still would have thought he was living on Mars! Without scientific truth, none of that could happen. Yet even the results of science tend to be abstractions. While "normal" body temperature's supposed to be 98.6, your average nurse will tell you it varies. Talk about variations, just try tracking your own blood pressure! A time or two, I thought I heard angels calling -- but it all averages out, doesn't it? Yet scientific fact is a truth on which we build our lives.

While each of us has his or her quirks, psychologists insist that being "in touch with reality" makes the difference between what we like to think of as being "normal," and winding up in psychiatric care.

From all of the above, it seems reasonable to me to insist that Truth belongs in that list of those values without which we can't live.

Looking for the Truth

Suppose we were, you and I, to go on a safari hunting for the truth. Where ought we to look?

We might travel back in time to the Athenian agora (marketplace) and listen to the greatest philosopher of all time, Socrates. We can hear him ask his pupil, Alcibiades, "And what is truth?" And from the conversation back and forth between teacher and student we might hear,

"Truth is the essence of wisdom."

Truth is that virtue that undergirds the state."

Yet all of that seems distant and detached. When we ponder truth, we look for values that reach out and touch the heart.

"I, Jim, take you, Sally, to be my wedded wife, and I do promise to be your loving and faithful husband as long as we both may live." For that couple, at that time -- and for all time -- that vow remains -- or certainly ought to remain -- their ultimate truth. That truth is the sun around which their lives will revolve, for however many years, may give them.

Truth is not something that comes, printing out of a super computer or -- for that matter -- out of the Hubble telescope or its successors. Truth is a living and sacred value that transforms everything we know.

There is, I believe, a real difference between knowledge and wisdom. In itself, knowledge seems little beyond a database -- a toolbox -- out of which we build our understandings of what really exists. Wisdom's different! It takes maturity and compassion to build wisdom out of knowledge. Humanity gets itself in all kinds of trouble mistaking knowledge for wisdom.

The Truth in God

There's an advantage in not preaching every Sunday. I now have time to "cogitate." When younger, I'm not sure I ever appreciated the wonders of "cogitation." By now, I've had about two months to run truth's mysteries through that master computer, a loving God put between my two ears.

Like every sermon, it seems inevitable that every article I write winds up having a text. As you've probably noticed, I chose John 8:32 for this personal meditation. For that matter, I even chose that passage in the King James Version, "...You shall know the Truth and the Truth will make you Free." We call the first four books of our New Testament "the Gospels" or "Good News." Jesus' message is not simply ABOUT the Truth. Jesus' words ARE Truth! In John's 14th chapter, we read, "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life. No one comes to the Father but by me." Those are words that make us Christian! To know Jesus brings the ultimate truth and wisdom about God and human experience is to discover the ultimate truth: "Jesus is Lord!" No wisdom, no philosophy has ever reached farther or deeper than that basic discovery.

About a week ago, *Time Magazine* did something really interesting with its cover. For only the second time in about 40 years, the *Time* cover went completely black. That darkness was broken only by a question highlighted in blazing red, "Is Truth Dead?" Both for me and for *Time's* editors, that cover boasted a unique significance. *Time* looked back at a much earlier cover from the 1960s. Also at that time, their cover went completely black. In that instance, again, the darkness was broken by another question, "Is God Dead?" *Time's* March cover took me instantly back to the "God is Dead" issue. Now, as a theologian, I know full well *Time's* editors had in mind a particular school of Protestant thought that -- in those days -- was termed "God Is Dead Theology". (Talk about an oxymoron!). But here's my point: When we act like God died, that -- it seems to me -- is the very instant when truth itself dies.

Could humans really be that blind? Oh yes, Friends, they surely could!

37 Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." 38 Pilate asked him, "What is truth?"

Here's irony to beggar Plato's record of Socrates' teaching! If only Pilate could have known what really was going on! In some ways, it doesn't even seem fair to Pilate! Of all the mistakes we humans have ever made, here's the ultimate! Can this ever be surpassed? Pilate asked him, "What is truth?" Confronted by the ultimate sum of all human wisdom in the person of our Lord, that's all Pilate has to offer?

Truth vs. "Not Quite the Truth"

In recent weeks, I've found myself researching the Protestant Reformation. The year 2017 marks 500 years since Martin Luther nailed his "95 Theses" on the cathedral door at Wittenberg University. At the time, it really wasn't all that alarming. It was common in the 16th century to post subjects for public debate in just this way. My guess is that not even Luther at that moment had the slightest idea that he had just kicked over the biggest hornet's nest in history!

If there was one thing on which Luther, Calvin, and Zwingli all agreed, it was our human tendency to create idols. Unwilling to trust God and obey God's commandments, we create our own versions of the God we claim to worship. For them, that was precisely how the Church ever got itself in such dire need of reforming!

As Christians, there is -- and there can be -- only one ultimate truth: The Truth in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Jesus criticizes the best of our human "goodness" and reminds us that we are -- in the end -- only men and women -- in need of God's forgiveness and God's redemption.

But we know better! In recent weeks, we've heard different variations of "truth" in news stories. If there's one thing I've learned throughout what has proved to be a long and blessed life, it is that Truth Is One. "And you shall know the truth, and the truth will make you free!"

Children’s Church

Have you ever watched the children happily skipping or walking toward Children’s Church on Sunday mornings and wondered what they will be doing there? I (the *Trinity Triumph* editor) know that an article about Children’s Church was published in a newsletter a few years ago, but I thought it might be time to revisit this important Sunday morning time. I asked some of the leaders for information and reflections, and now I think perhaps I would like to pretend I were a child again and happily skip down the hallway to Children’s Church, as well.

There are certain components of Children’s Church, but the leaders can vary how they conduct the activities. Children’s Church begins with a **call to worship**. Recently they have been using one that was created by the kids and a leader. Some leaders have a time for **singing** during Children’s Church.

A **Bible lesson** follows the call to worship and song. *Sermons4Kids* is a website that offers great resources and has been used for a couple of years. This site gives the Children’s Church leader a Bible lesson each week to teach. Often a student reads the Bible verses, and great discussions about the Bible verses follow. The children are usually open and honest with their questions and ideas, and listening to them is refreshing.

The **activity period** offers many opportunities for learning and creating. Activities can be varied to cover a range of ages, and the older children are able to help the younger ones. *Sermons4Kids* gives the Children's Church leader coloring pages, activities, and other suggestions to support the Bible lesson. Question/answer cards about the Bible might also be used by a leader. The kids have made cards for our shut-ins and for Linda, our young *ChildFund* girl in Uganda. They have made "The Armor of God," painted pots and planted flowers for Mother's Day last year, and they all worked together to create the bulletin board that is now down by the Youth Room. Everyone is encouraged to check out the bulletin board created by the kids.

Prayer is an important part of this time, and the kids might offer their prayer requests, or they might offer to pray themselves. If there is any extra time, a fun period of **play** is enjoyed

I gathered some interesting reflections from the leaders who really enjoy listening to the children discuss the Bible verses. The children ask and answer questions in great dialogue with the adults and one another. They might discuss why Jesus would have chosen to do what he did in a situation, and they often offer their own thoughts about the lesson. They enjoyed learning about Linda and comparing her life with their own. The children seem to love God and religious things, and overall, they love coming to church.

Thank you to Children's Church leaders Becky Allison, Karen and Jared Cox, Elva Frick, Kris and Todd Hawk, and Marsha Mortimer and also Jonathan Patterson for helping during this 2016-2017 Church School year.

Support for Mission Co-Worker Chenoa Stock—Since last year, we have committed to being a partner with Chenoa in her role as a PC(USA) mission co-worker in Bolivia. Chenoa’s work is part of the Joining Hands Network, and their mission is based on advocacy and long-term sustainable change. The Joining Hands Network in Bolivia focuses on advocating for environmental justice, specifically working for the passing of the Water Law, which has been sitting in Parliament since June 2012, being blocked by mining and other industrial interests. As the network develops this campaign, Chenoa is hoping there will be more advocacy that U.S. congregations can do to support them in this effort of international support.

The mission co-worker term was changed from missionary a few years ago to emphasize that today’s mission co-workers work *with* the global partners, co-working alongside them, accompanying them, and not dominating agendas on their culture, as was sometimes the stigma with “missionaries.” It is to change the idea of their role and accompaniment with their global partners.

To help support Chenoa, let us continue to pray for her work and the people she serves. Let us continue to read her newsletter items and educate ourselves on the issues that are the core of her work.

More importantly, we will be focusing on our financial support of Chenoa and her mission work through a special offering from May 14-June 25. Our financial support, as well as the support of other congregations around the country, is becoming increasingly important as the PC(USA) central office funds for direct support of the mission co-workers reduces. We ask that you prayerfully consider helping to support Chenoa through this special offering. Please mark your special offering envelopes indicating Chenoa Stock.

YoungLives—YoungLives works with teen moms in our area with the dedication of volunteer mentors. Bible study and learning essential life skills are part of this ministry, one of the local programs Trinity supports.
