Hello and greetings from Bolivia, Trinity United Presbyterian Church!

I hope this finds you all enjoying your spring, which hopefully by the time this newsletter is published, feels more like spring!

As for us - our family was finally reunited in early March after two months, and we are now settling back in to life in Bolivia with a baby. What a change! But before making our move, we had a whirlwind week of Jose's arrival to the US, celebrating Leandro's baptism in my home church in Pittsburgh, PA, and then a quick trip to DC to finalize Leandro's Bolivian citizenship. Besides a canceled flight, all went swimmingly. It was great to be with family and close friends to welcome Leandro into God's family and to know that we were leaving for Bolivia with all paperwork completed.

We have been back a little over two weeks now and are settling into a routine. The sun of La Paz has been welcoming after a cold St. Louis winter. We are enjoying walks outside and introducing Leandro to his Bolivian family and friends here. Though I am on maternity leave for another two weeks, Leandro and I participated in UMAVIDA's General Assembly our first week back. We were received with love, though Leandro really stole the show.

Mission and Church Life Reflections

"A Tall Order"

Although I was not serious when I offered to write the opening article which is usually reserved for a member of the clergy, I was invited to write a reflective article of some type for this issue of the *Trinity Triumph* in the place of a pastor's article. This invitation was not a tall order, but it was definitely a tall challenge that I accepted while wondering when I was going to learn not to make these joking offers.

The majority of my writing involves a humorous approach, so my first concern was to think of an appropriate subject of interest that related to Christianity or Trinity United Presbyterian Church with some amount of seriousness. My second concern was to choose a subject that was within my scope of knowledge, and my third concern was to relate something Biblical in the article. This challenge was getting taller by the hour.

Since mission is my passion, and I am the chair of the Mission and Church Life Committee at Trinity, the subject area was beginning to narrow. Including something Biblical was not difficult as I remember the many times we have heard and read Matthew 25:40: "The King will reply, 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."" (NIV) In the past few years this has become an integral part of my thinking for each special offering or mission project in which we participate. I visualize how we serve God through our support of Chenoa in Bolivia, our Christmas Child boxes that could be sent anywhere in the world, our support of hunger programs and skill-building programs in our community, and our special offerings that cover a wide array of needs from helping with disasters in the U.S. and around the world to helping victims of domestic violence in our community. This is only a partial list of the many ways we have accepted calls to help God by helping the least of these. Trinity congregation members are offered numerous opportunities to help with monetary gifts or tangible items, and I always encourage church family members to choose what touches the heart. My hope is that by choosing what touches one's heart, whatever gift is offered is given in love, and not just given with a feeling of obligation. I am ever grateful for the generous response from the congregation with each of our offerings, collections, and projects.

Wishing to expound more deeply about our church family and about mission, I began thinking of my personal focus word during our recent observance of Lent. I chose the word "humility" this year, and I thought how more meaningful our service to God and His people is if we serve with humility. This thought sent me to the concordance of my Bible where I located two Scripture readings which instructed us to clothe ourselves with humility. In Colossians 3:12 Paul stated, "Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience." (NIV) He continued by instructing the Colossians (and us) to forgive one another as God has forgiven us. This passage ends in verse 14 with, "And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect harmony." (NIV) This may or may not seem like a tall order that Paul gave to the Colossians and for us to follow, as well.

Reflecting on this passage in Colossians, I think of the many tireless volunteers in our church family who are serving God with myriad essential tasks to keep our church strong in worship, Bible study, Church School programs, and fellowship activities, while other volunteers offer service with the upkeep of the building and grounds. I think of their humble attitudes and patience as they use their time and talents for the Trinity family. I think of those who clothe themselves with compassion, kindness, and gentleness through their prayers of concern, phone calls, cards and notes, and visits to church members. I have commented to several volunteers that I sense that some members may not realize the extent of all the volunteer efforts, and I regret that our volunteers do not always receive the recognition they deserve. One person humbly responded, "It doesn't matter; God knows." I see each volunteer clothed with a warm cloak of love uniting with kindness and patience in his or her service to Trinity and God. I greatly appreciate the time and talents selflessly given in service by our volunteers.

Throughout the year we receive thank you notes and newsletters from agencies and organizations which Trinity supports. As I read these I can sense the virtues from Paul's list in some of these notes. All notes are filled with gratitude, but some strongly express the love and compassion for those they serve. When I drop off our collected items at various agencies, the utmost gratitude is always given, but often I hear stories filled with compassion and love about the individuals they serve. These stories are told with humility, often emphasizing the gentleness of those who come for help, but in no way boasting or emphasizing the good deeds of the agency.

My "hands on" volunteering at The Fellowship of Christ's Community, the outreach program of Central Presbyterian and one of the programs Trinity supports, is the soul of my personal mission activities. Whether I am bantering with the other volunteers in the kitchen, interacting with the other teachers and students in the Learning for Life Class, or helping to serve a meal to our guests, I can observe various forms of interaction and appreciate a combination of sincerity and Paul's identified virtues clothing the volunteers, as well as those whom we serve.

As we at Trinity continue to participate in our mission projects and perform essential volunteer tasks at church, I hope we accept Paul's instructions to clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, with love binding these all together in unity. Perhaps Paul's instructions are not such a tall order for us after all. On the other hand, the tall challenge of writing this column so that it is satisfactory to me has grown much taller, and it has helped me to clothe myself in another layer of humility.

Support for Mission Co-Worker Chenoa Stock—Since 2016, we have committed to being a partner with Chenoa in her role as a PC(USA) mission co-worker in Bolivia. Chenoa's work is part of the Joining Hands Network, and their mission is based on advocacy and long-term sustainable change. The Joining Hands Network in Bolivia focuses on advocating for environmental justice, particularly focusing on water.

The mission co-worker term was changed from missionary a few years ago to emphasize that today's mission co-workers work *with* the global partners, co-working alongside them, accompanying them, and not forcing foreign agendas on their culture, as was sometimes the stigma with "missionaries." It is to change the idea of their role and accompaniment with their global partners.

To help support Chenoa, let us continue to pray for her work and the people she serves. Let us continue to read her newsletter items and educate ourselves on the issues that are the core of her work.

More importantly, we will be focusing on our financial support of Chenoa and her mission work through a special offering from May 6-June 3. Our financial support, as well as the support of other congregations around the country, is becoming increasingly important as the PC(USA) central office funds for direct support of the mission co-workers reduces. We ask that you prayerfully consider helping to support Chenoa through this special offering. Please mark the white, special offering envelopes indicating Chenoa Stock on the front. The following is an excerpt in a recent newsletter from Cheryl Reed, the local YoungLives director. This may give you an understanding of some of the mentoring activities of their volunteers.

"We also met with teen moms one on one. Recently one of our mentors helped a Jr. Leader move into her first apartment. This young mom is currently working full time and now she is living in her own safe apartment. The mentor also helped this young mom set up a monthly budget. Another mentor went to visit a teen mom who graduated out of YoungLives and now lives in another town. They took their kids to an indoor pool and enjoyed catching up with each other. I have taken a young mom out for lunch and we also worked on a monthly budget over burgers and fries. This mom is graduating from high school in May and is looking towards employment and stable housing. Add to this a fun night of jewelry making, two Bible Studies, and one St. Patrick's Day Club.... and that makes for a lot of time with teen moms."

We also received this note of thanks from Cheryl:

Dear Mission and Church Life Committee,

Thank you so much for your \$300 donation toward YoungLives. Last week we had 7 teen moms come together to make apple pies. Two are newly pregnant with their first child, one just recovered from an emergency C-section <u>and</u> the loss of her great-grandmother. They <u>all</u> need Christ and community. Your support enables us to reach these girls who live outside the church community.

Pastor Nominating Committee Update

The Pastor Nominating Committee began meeting in January. During this and following monthly meetings, our charge was to incorporate the information from the **Faithful Listening and the Path Process** exercise from late last year into the 10-page Ministry Information Form.

The Ministry Information Form (MIF) is a document that details information about our congregation's vision for ministry:

- how the congregation feels called to address emerging needs of the community
- how this position will help Trinity United Presbyterian Church reach vision and mission goals
- descriptions of characteristics needed by the candidate, and candidate responsibilities

After many revisions, the Pastor Nominating Committee completed the Ministry Information Form and obtained the necessary approval signatures from the Pastor Nominating Committee Chairman and the Session Clerk during the March 18, 2018 Session meeting.

The Ministry Information Form was emailed to Mary Jane Knapp, the Muskingum Valley Presbytery Chair of the Parish Elders, on March 24, 2018. Mary Jane responded with the password to the Church Leadership Connection found on the Presbyterian Church (USA) website. The MIF was posted to the website and to date, the Pastor Nominating Committee has received a number of Personal Information Form (PIF) "matches".

The committee is now in the process of reviewing PIF "matches" and deciding on questions for the candidate interview process

Book Review

The Way Back by Phil Cooke and Johnathan Bock

A subtitle for this book is *How Christians Blew Our Credibility and HOW WE GET IT Back*. While driving to town one morning, I had the car radio tuned to Glenn Beck. Beck was interviewing one of the authors, Phil Cooke. Both authors are considered marketing experts in films and media programing, and both are active Christians. I decided to get the book; later I got another which is available in our church library. I recommend church attendees to read this book which gives examples for congregations and us as individuals on how to fulfill our Christian commitments. The authors argue effectively and cite research figures on church attendance, reading the Bible, praying, and more. They describe ongoing innovative missions that are effectively serving community needs in various locations. They also add some new ideas. One idea is to act like what we believe by putting "fun" into funerals. "Going home to the Lord," a common phase in obituaries, would be celebrated as if it's a graduation into the rest of life, a life in eternity with our Lord. Another, even bolder idea, would wipe out the foster care system provided each Christian church took two foster care children to raise.

I particularly liked what they wrote about Christian commitment and behavior in the early centuries of the church. Although those Christians were oppressed, persecuted, and often executed, their numbers grew. That in itself I find mind boggling. Their willingness to tackle the worst social problems and injustices didn't go unnoticed. In time they changed the Roman culture because their Christian values and actions to better society no longer could be ignored. Now, unfortunately, in many areas Christians are less active and less credible. How do we get it back? Find out! Read the book, and let's talk about it.

NAMI's Support Groups are unique because they follow a structured model to ensure you and others in the group have an opportunity to be heard and to get what you need. This new group will meet on a monthly basis to start.

What You'll Gain

By sharing your experiences in a safe and confidential setting, you gain hope and develop relationships. The group encourages empathy, productive discussion and a sense of community.

NAMI Connection Recovery Support Group will help you:

- See the individual first, not the illness
- Recognize that mental illnesses are medical illnesses that may have environmental triggers
- Understand that mental illnesses are traumatic events
- Aim for better coping skills
- Find strength in sharing experiences
- Reject stigma and not tolerate discrimination
- Not judge anyone's pain
- Forgive ourselves and reject guilt
- Embrace humor as healthy
- Accept that we cannot solve every problem
- Work for a better future in a realistic way

"NAMI Connection has enabled me to take a good look at my illness and see that I am not alone. The program has given me additional tools to not only accept my illness, but to help others along the way."

"... People can solve problems [at a NAMI Connection Recovery Support Group]. It isn't just a bunch of sad stories; people are coming up with solutions and stuff to do for the next week. One of our group attendees is taking her meds and getting herself to her counselor and is just about able to go back to her career in great part due to Connection."
