Culture Of Discontent

OR ...

Attitude Of Gratitude

What follows is one of those issues an Interim Pastor is supposed to address. And frankly I haven't seen it here. To your credit! However, I'll put it forth anyway because I'm still too new to have seen everything and no group is completely perfect and maybe it's lurking here or there and this might help.

The letters of the New Testament in large part have to do with messy misapplications of the Gospel. These occurred almost immediately after the death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus as the Christ. Christ called himself the Truth that sets free. The tellers of that Truth are the Gospel writers and letter writers of the Christian Scripture, and with a couple of exceptions they are the ones who had known, physically served with Jesus. They became the Apostles and all of them note how quickly the Church began to crumble when the foundation began to grumble.

The book Jude is about this. Reading in Jude with a Sunday school class during the summer we came across a harsh denouncement: "But these people slander whatever they do not understand, and are destroyed by those things that, like irrational animals, they know by instinct. Woe to them! For they go the way of Cain, abandon themselves to Balaam's error for the sake of gain, and perish in Korah's rebellion. These are blemishes on your agape-feasts, while they dine with you without fear, feeding themselves. They are shepherds who care only for themselves."

And what Jude says is pretty much easy to understand. But what's this *Korah's rebellion*.

An Auckland, New Zealand minister, Elizabeth Ostring, writing in a journal for pastors, begins her article with the following:

"is your church membership on the decline? Has the stewardship growth and financial position of the church not been as robust as you planned or expected? Is your church finding itself unable to attract and minister to the youth?

"Look out for the hidden enemy within your church ... common but deadly condition that infects most churches ... lethal to the spiritual body of the church ... hard to overcome Its name? Discontent. Murmuring discontent."

She's read her bible. "Murmuring" is a common English translation, for example, in the Hebrew telling of the complaining of the Israelites during their escape from Egypt. They complained and complained about this or that hardship. They complained about their leaders not doing things right, fast enough, complete enough, just plain not enough.

Murmuring discontent is something "deadly and dangerous," Ms. Ostring writes, threatening Church life and Church growth, Church power and Church strength, thus threatening the power and strength of individual members.

Sometimes, she writes, the effects take years to be seen. She draws from Israel's history to point out what she calls dangerous cliques within the various tribes, from within the tribes the cliques suffocating the life of the tribes, with some demagogue at the helm, one of which was this *Korah*, a cousin of Moses (Exodus 6:20-24), who became a malcontent leader of the rebellion against Moses (Num. 16). She writes about Korah's associates in the rebellion. They turn out to be his next-door neighbors, the people closest to the rebel Korah — Dathan, Abiram, and On. As she put it, these three would gather around their tent doors to chitchat (behind-back gossip) for the express purpose of encouraging discontent. And these rebellious thoughts, actions, something that was initially confined to these men and their immediate families and friends, finally spread wildfire like and ended up destroying the community.

As the Interpreter's Bible has it, "Korah was the leader of a group of malcontents who 'became arrogant and took their stand before Moses." They "gathered in a body against Moses and Aaron, and said to Moses and Aaron, 'Enough of you; for all the community are holy, ... since the Lord is in their midst; why then do you exalt yourselves above the Lord's assembly?"

And, we're told, the Lord was not at all pleased with this. But even so the faithful leader Moses still plead for those that turned against him. This is reminiscent of another man, another leader from another time who said something like "forgive them, Father, for they know not what they do".

Korah, gathered "the whole community" against Moses. And yet if it had not been for Moses' intercession, we're told, the Lord would have consumed the whole community. Moses is finally able to induce Israel to move away from the "the tents of these wicked men." And the ground under their tents "opened its mouth and swallowed them up, ... and all the men who belonged to Korah. ... So they ... descended in to Sheol alive ... and the perished from the community" (Nu. 16: 1-34; Josephus Antiquities IV.2.1-4.2).

Mercyl Gets this pastor's (a potential Korah?!) attention!

Back to Elizabeth Ostring's article. After a litany of this and other like events in the life of the Hebrew people discontented, complaining, *murmuring*, she offers the following:

- 1. Take statistics seriously. If your church membership, participation, witness, stewardship, and other hallmarks of effective ministry begin to show a decline, ask the congregation and leaders for self-examination. Is there a spirit of discontent and complaint slowly spreading in your midst? IF so, approach it prayerfully and, in time, deal with it so that harmony and unity once again return to the church.
- 2. Complaining leads to decline. If a group is declining or just not growing, murmuring discontent may be an unrecognized cause. This message needs to be shared with the membership. Personal appeal is probably a good place to start, but public messages are also important. These messages can be general or explicit if the nature of the discontent is clear. This is not easy work, especially for those dedicated to caring for others, such as pastors.
- 3. Examine your own heart. A discontented pastor, such as the Levite Korah, is just as much a church risk as a discontented church member.
- 4. Look for unhealthy cliques that spread a culture discontent. They need to be confronted in a spirit of God's love and power. The Israel narrative indicates that here are three characteristics of groups that lead to danger: (a) they know better than anyone else, usually in retrospect (Korah, Dathan, and Abiram); (b) they consider their own leadership superior (Korah); and (c) they focus on their own needs to the exclusion of the community [look up "Zimri"].
- 5. Recognize that the issues may have either occurred, or been around, for decades.
- 6. Encourage members to develop an attitude of gratitude. Research shows that this is a powerful factor in general good health and well-being. Simply asking people to note and record a few things each day for which they are grateful is powerfully effective.
- 7. The reality of the Promised Land needs to be kept before the congregation. Christians need the vision of building up the kingdom of God, not the kingdom of the church in the wildwood.

And it's possible to be a grand Church, she says, quoting Paul's theme of Christ empowered triumph: "With God all things are possible." And also the Revelation words of Jesus, "To him or to her who overcomes I will give to eat from the tree of life' ... and 'He or she who overcomes shall not be hurt by the second death' ... and 'I will give some of the hidden manna to eat And I will give them a white stone...[with] new names' ... and 'I will not blot out their names from the Book of Life; but I will confess their names before My Father and before His angels."

All premised on *constructive*, not destructive, critique. A difference! And what is that difference, what's it like to live there as opposed to where Jude and how many others have lived contending against pastors and people inspiring churches to stumble. The difference is between that which downdrags and that which is the Force that "gives us the victory."

Acolyte Training October 27th 9:00 a.m. in the Narthex





Reformation Sunday... what is it?

The last Sunday in October is the occasion for churches in the Lutheran and Reformed traditions to commemorate a key date in the Reformation movement in 16th-century Europe. On 31 October 1517, Martin Luther, a Catholic cleric, posted a note of protest to a church door in Wittenberg, Germany an act that provoked reaction in church and state circles throughout Europe and fed into the movement that led to the creation of the Lutheran and Reformed churches. It is important to remember that the first reformers understood themselves as trying to rectify abuses from within the one church; they did not set out to form a new denomination. On Reformation Sunday we hope to emphasize the ongoing nature of church reform, which is in continuity with the original ideal of the Reformation. This is an opportunity to look not only back at the 16th century, but ahead to the ways in which the church is "reformed and always being reformed according to the Word of God." What do you see God doing among us now? How is He shaping us to be more faithful Christians?
