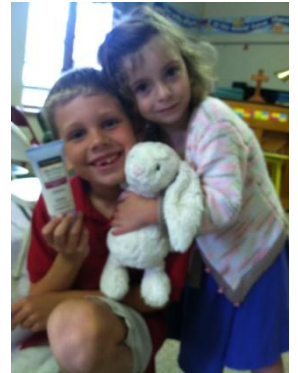

An Exciting Time to Be the Church

"We are fools for Christ, but you are so wise" – 1 Corinthians 4
"For the message of the cross is foolishness ... but to those being saved the power" 1 Cor. 1

"For Christ died for us and rose from the dead for us" -- Romans 8

"SEND IN THE CLOWNS" **(Steven Sondheim)**

One day I read a critique from a man who blog-commented, "Christians are clowns." I don't remember specifics. Somewhere along the way, he felt expelled.

I thought of a similar critique. This from a young woman, Bethany – Beth, similarly feeling unsuitable, and expressing it differently, she told the minister, "I'm thankful for all the Church has done!" And now she wanted to know what she could do, what she should do. She'd been living on a shaky limb, she said, her emotions calling the shots, a weak connection to the trunk with its roots, which is *the mind*. And then the branch breaks and she falls and she's hurt and Christ through the Church picks her up. She used "saved."

Without going into particulars, Bethany told her story. You'll have to fill in the blanks. [However, unlike *A Little Night Music*, shall we say, her "blanks" had nothing to do with ... are you ready for this ... SEX.]

And so, Beth said, "I lived in feeling-of-the-moment times." Immoral. She called it "immoral." Then saved! she said. But, lo and behold, "I was saved but still immoral!" Even though saved. The immoral just took on a new character. "I became," she said, "a prig." She said *prig*. A young, young woman up-to-date saying prig! Who talks like that nowadays? Someone, I guess, who has had to look up words, so to speak, trying to define herself.

Beth said that in this *new* state of immoral she started being critical. No one was good enough for her. No one was good enough *for her charity*. Then she said she woke up one day confused. She was confused again! Like before. When she was on that limb. Because, and again without going into specifics, you fill in the blanks, Beth awakened to the idea that some things done in her former life would have been good things had she done them in the *right context*. She had awakened, Beth said, to the idea that she had become a person critical and condemning without the depth of the empathy of the likes of the Christ who challenged "*How much more valuable is a man than a sheep* (Matt. 13)" and "*taking the consecrated bread he ate* (Luke 6)".

Bethany thought: bright new idea for me, I misuse context and so doing I miss entirely the point.

It's an exciting time to be the church seeking to discern context. Boundaries for the Truth can set free, dignifying Truth, up building, upholding, challenging, an unnerving Truth lived solid to the root. Think of yourself as "activist." See yourself part of a good influence. See this through your presence, your prayer, your financial support, your actions within sanctuary walls. I look at the tremendous people of the Church. I see all the giving in every realm. And I am proud and I am thank-full. What hope would there be for someone whose trapeze breaks and she falls and yet still alive she's on the ground but there are no "fools for Christ" to surround for the picking of her

up. The fall of humankind but no send in the clowns.

It's not some weak-limbed moral relativism. The words of Jesus as the Christ are full of sonorous warning. But keep in mind it's warning with the hope of joy, his joy, and his joy *for us* (John 17), something he said in the shadow of crucifixion. My Church, He said, against which the gates of hell will not prevail. Which means *context*.

I read about a high school freshman, Nathan. He lived in Idaho. He went to his science class with a petition. He wanted his classmates and teachers to sign it. He created this petition. It was against a dangerous substance. He was all worked up when he presented it to them. Dihydrogen monoxide is something, he said, that can cause vomiting, and sweating. It is found in acid rain. In its gaseous state it can cause severe burns. If inhaled it can cause death. It contributes to soil erosion. It makes automobile brakes less effective. Its presence has been detected in some cancerous tumors. He was all emotional and he had this petition in his hands and there was this big inhuman corporate pollution with all its death and destruction and he was right there and they were right there and he had this petition and they signed it right then.

Forty-seven of the 50 students and teachers of Nathan's science class signed it. Moral victory. Except for the fact that no one wondered about dihydrogen monoxide. Style over substance. Emotion over concept. Heart over mind. Because dihydrogen monoxide is water. While it's true that water brings flood tides and all kinds of bad aftermath, no one could live without it. The broad

brush-stroke petition against it was immoral. Beth used the word prig.

When Simon Peter tried to prevent Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, Peter in all sincerity, Peter well intentioned and wishing the good for Christ trying to prevent him going up, Jesus stung him: Get thee behind me Satan. I think I will say it this way: it's usually demonically immoral to be emotionally led.

So it's an exciting time to be the Church. Ideas deepen, and through that relationships deepen, and through that The Relationship deepens. Confusion can lead to clarity, leading to confusion leading to clarity, saving upon saving! It is part of the meaning of the theological term *sanctification*, a growth process and strength process and power process through time and effort process. And when that happens ongoing, it's a Church process -- it IS to be the Church! -- and that church becomes a physical space for energy toward a spirit that it is toward the *Spirit*! Saved. Saved was the word Beth used.

I'm hoping you understand that when we get together for worship and study and everything else, it *does* matter. Something *is* being done. *Your* very regular presence, regardless how little you think of you, your presence matters. All the people doing all the stuff, facility stuff, teaching stuff, the leading, the working in every realm. These are those who together provide the means to give a hand up to someone momentarily grounded. Fools, "clowns" the man wrote. Christians are clowns. God send them.

Gangway to Galilee Painting

Have you seen this painting in the Narthex? The painting was done by our own Tim Patterson for this year's VBS program. Tim usually tries to do some sort of decoration - a poster, illustration or graphic to go with the theme of the program. This year's program was called Gangway to Galilee and featured a nautical theme.

"One of the earlier ideas I came up with was Jesus teaching from the boat. The idea of drawing the crowd appealed to me, I thought it would be a fun challenge. I've used a variety of media over the years, but this year I was in the mood to do a watercolor, which I think worked very well with the illustration.

I did do some research, looking up images of the landscape and even found a photo of a reconstruction of a boat that dated back to Jesus' time. I tried to show a variety of reactions in the crowd, from outrage to joy, because that is what we read in the Bible. It took me three or four days to complete the painting, working just a few hours each day. I did take a great deal of artistic license in one aspect of the image - there is a red-headed chap depicted in the congregation who almost certainly wasn't in the crowd that day! "



Maple Tree Lessons Learned

Our Zanesville weather, this summer, has grown infamous for its variety. One moment, the sun's out, wispy clouds hover overhead. Just wait a moment! Without much notice, huge thunderheads march heavily across the sky. Rain? Think monsoons! String all of those together, and you've got a summer. Who knows? Maybe you've even got a fall!

Out our way, on Wilmer Street, the most recent rain, accompanied with thunder, lightning, and everything but hail, had left us in the night. Shod with my trusty slippers, wearing shorts and my t-shirt, I poked my head out our front door -- hoping to find the Times Recorder. There it was, right where our delivery-boy tossed it with a single, masterful shot. There was, however, something else -- something altogether not expected. What I found was a huge limb of our aging maple tree! This was not just a few leaves attached to an insignificant branch. No. This looked like trouble! At first, I thanked our Lord it missed the porch! The limb was about a foot in diameter. There were leaves enough to start a small forest!

What to do? I've got an old, electric chain-saw out in our garage. On the other hand, it's not been used in a coon's age. (How long, actually, do coons live?) Worse, Sally has ominous premonitions. She's sure I'll chop off one of my own limbs trying to use that saw. Of course, she could be right!

So we sit at our breakfast table ruminating. What to do? Should we call the tree people? (Who, exactly ARE the tree people! What might they

charge?) Weighing our options, we do the inevitable -- we phone our friends, Dave and Betty. We expect sage advice. Instead, given about seven minutes, the two of them pull up in front of our house.

"Yep!" opined Dave. "It's a tree!"

"I really needed that!"

"Let me get my saw from our trunk," suggests Dave.

About that moment, who lumbers into sight but Jim, our neighbor. To me, Jim looks about ten feet tall (allowing for my tendency to exaggerate!). Better still, Jim not only has a wicked-looking chain-saw in working condition, he also has a huge trailer attached to his truck to haul the whole thing out of sight. All of us worked together, laughing, hoisting, throwing branches into Jim's trailer. In fifteen minutes, our crisis has passed.

Later, we called a certified arborist to shore-up our ailing tree. (Removing it would only leave us to broil in summer heat!) Our maple tree now is better than ever.

Our maple tree lessons, nonetheless, are priceless. These lessons teach about what it means to be a neighbor and a friend. There are biblical parables to teach such things. We learned them from our maple tree and our friends.

An Interview with 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Grade Teacher, Jan Jenkins

I have been teaching Sunday School for 13 years. Marti Myers convinced me that I would be good at it. At the time she was my room mother at Dillon School, and I taught both of her daughters in second grade. I enjoy this age, because their faith is so very pure. They believe everything in the Bible happened just as it is written, and I believe exactly the same thing. Also, this age is very open and they want me to know everything that has happened since I last saw them. I try to tie their discussion into the lesson from this week or last.

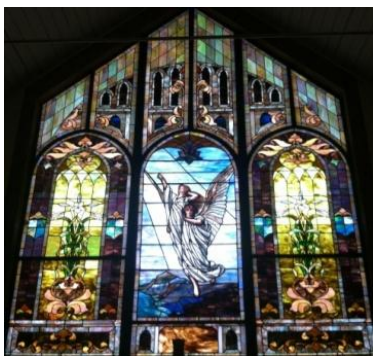
Each month they mark a verse in their bible and work on memorizing it. All my favorite verses are hung around the room. I think my most favorite is *"The Lord is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer."* from 2nd Samuel 22:2.

My children decided that if God is a rock He must be a fancy one with many sparkles, not just a plain gray one. I collect rocks from around the world, thanks to my traveling son and sister, so that is why this is my favorite verse.

I retired after teaching 35 years at Dillon School. I seem to be just as busy as when I was teaching. I make cookies every other week for Red Cross. I plant flowers outside the church. My husband, daughter and I clean at the church each week. I visit some of the shut-ins from the church. My daughter and I do a craft each week with the mentally ill at Beacon Place and once a month for the FCC group. That bunch has grown to about 50, and as they have gotten to know us, they are very open, appreciative and ask us to pray for various concerns they have. I am also part of the Prayer Shawl group. I get finished shawls ready for the shelf and keep the records for the group along with crocheting shawls.

I enjoy when my former students come back and talk to me on their way to or from class. I would hope their faith would remain strong and just as pure as when they were in 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grades.

Community Center: Bethel Community Center is an outreach program of Rolling Plains United Methodist Church. Their mission statement is: "Our mission is to share the love of Jesus as we engage and equip neighbors to create a connected, thriving community." It is a non-profit organization operated 100% by volunteers and funded 100% by donations. Their mission is to serve the children and families of the Putnam neighborhood.

Over 3000 meals were served to children and adults this summer at Lunch in the Park across the street from the center. This after school program is offered Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 3:30-5:00. The program offers a safe sanctuary and a place for help in reading and math.
