

“Never On a Sunday”

Back in 1960, while I was finishing my first, full year as a pastor, the movie, “Never on a Sunday,” made its appearance. The film’s plot introduces us to a self-employed, free-spirited young lady on the Greek island of Piraeus. The film’s haunting theme song became an instant, though short-lived sensation.

While there were a great many things our heroine found to occupy her time during the rest of the week, she had her own rules. Basic to them was the phrase “Never on Sunday!”

What do you suppose Melina Mercouri had in common with God? Both of them rested on Sunday!

Now, on one hand, that might seem trivial. Really, though, it’s not! The sabbath, or “The Lord’s Day,” (More about that later!) goes to the very heart of the Bible’s creation story. The sabbath helped define what it meant to be Jewish. In the same way, “The Lord’s Day” has come to define what it means to be Christian.

As the Book of Genesis concludes its first great creation story (the second one begins on chapter 2:4b), it uses the following words:

Thus the heavens and the earth were finished, and all their multitude. 2 And on the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. 3 So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation.

God’s blessing of the sabbath is only the beginning! By the time we trace out God’s intention, it reaches from earth’s first morning to beyond our planet’s final day!

Ordinarily, when thinking about the sabbath, our natural tendency is to believe only people were involved. In reality, however, the sabbath involved animals too.

8 Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. 9 Six days you shall labor and do all your work. 10 But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. 11 For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

In time, as Israel meditated on the meaning of sabbath rest, it was extended beyond people and animals to include even the land itself. Every seventh year, the soil itself was to lie fallow (resting) that it might continue to bear fruit. Farmers today understand this bit of divine wisdom. Today, we call it “crop rotation.” Here in America, we’ve learned that when the land is over-farmed, it does become sterile. If nothing else, that’s one of many agricultural lessons learned during our Great Depression of the 1930s.

Respect for God’s creation is also a lesson currently being learned by ecologists everywhere. Earlier in history, readers of the Bible made a crucial mistake! By putting emphasis on God’s command that human beings (“Man”) were to become the masters of the earth and to subdue it, we literally despoiled the earth. By putting the emphasis on sabbath rest, we discover God’s real intention: we are intended to become earth’s caretakers. Working WITH what God created, we provide a peaceful home for all the earth. Isaiah, in the 65th chapter of his prophecy, created a vision of “the peaceable kingdom:”

25 The wolf and the lamb shall feed together,
the lion shall eat straw like the ox;
but the serpent—its food shall be dust!
They shall not hurt or destroy
on all my holy mountain,
says the Lord.

As scholars worked their way through God’s sabbath-command, rules became increasingly restrictive. Not only was there to be no cooking on the sabbath, no one was permitted to make a fire. Even healing was forbidden on God’s special day. Healing, thus, was defined as “work.” Jesus had little patience with that command. In Matthew 12, we find a direct conflict between biblical scholarship of Jesus’ day and our Savior’s ministry:

9 He left that place and entered their synagogue; 10 a man was there with a withered hand, and they asked him, “Is it lawful to cure on the sabbath?” so that they might accuse him. 11 He said to them, “Suppose one of you has only one sheep and it falls into a pit on the sabbath; will you not lay hold of it and lift it out? 12 How much more valuable is a human being than a sheep! So it is lawful to do good on the sabbath.” 13 Then he said to the man, “Stretch out your hand.” He stretched it out, and it was restored, as sound as the other. 14 But the Pharisees went out and conspired against him, how to destroy him.

Jesus clearly understood that the sabbath was made for humans, not the other way around. Before it is anything else, the sabbath is a vision of the peace that our Lord intends, not just for people, but for the whole of God’s creation!

A while ago, I promised to move beyond the sabbath to Sunday. We don’t always understand those two words are not synonymous.

The sabbath is, quite literally, “the seventh day.” Basically then, the sabbath extends from sundown on Friday to sundown on Saturday. That’s when our Jewish neighbors honor God’s sabbath command.

Sunday, however, is more properly called “The Lord’s Day.” As Christians, our chosen day of worship is the FIRST day of the week, because that’s when Jesus rose from the dead! The Resurrection points beyond this life to Life Everlasting. That’s just what I meant when I wrote that the sabbath points beyond itself to beyond earth’s final day. For us, as Christians, Sunday is that ultimate sabbath pointing to that Kingdom preached by Jesus.

German theologian, Jürgen Moltmann, in his great work, ***God in Creation***, helps us to see the sabbath’s eternal dimension:

The sabbath is itself the presence of eternity in time, and a foretaste of the world to come. The observance of the sabbath became the identifying mark of Jews in exile; and in the same way, the doctrine of the sabbath of creation becomes the identifying mark of the biblical doctrine of creation, distinguishing it from the interpretation of the world as nature. It is the sabbath which manifests the world’s identity as creation, sanctifies it and blesses it.

As Moltmann reminds us, no Sunday, no sabbath, ever is unimportant. Wherever either is celebrated, we are reminded that the earth and all of us living on this planet are precious in God’s sight.

There is certainly another warning in all of this... The world around us is seriously in danger of forgetting the God who made us all and who, through our Lord, is busy saving the best that’s in us.

Sunday observance, strangely enough, wasn’t always easy for farm families. Even though they weren’t caught up in the city hustle and bustle, there were always chores. Cows still needed to be milked. Other chores could, perhaps, wait for Monday, but complete rest was always hard to come by.

Sabbath/Sunday observance in our part of the 21st century seems even more complicated. Work schedules seldom allow Sunday to be a time for worship and relaxation. In the former United Presbyterian Church in North America, “Sabbath Observance” meant going to sleep and taking a nap. Anything else was sinful! For PCUSA churches, Sunday usually means going to church and doing whatever else seems suitable.

As I keep on studying God’s Word, and meditating on the sabbath and on the Lord’s Day, it has helped me to remember this part of Scripture as a reminder that God’s cares about the whole of God’s creation. For the rest of us, that also means remembering to worship as God’s invitation to share His saving grace with us and all living on this blue and gleaming planet, until God’s Kingdom comes in all its fullness, in God’s good time.

Meet Kathy Hixson—Trinity's Pianist/Organist

I was born in Lima, Ohio, the third of four children. My parents worked hard to send us to the Catholic School and provided piano lessons when I turned 7. Although our piano was in the dining room area which was very close to the television room, I was always allowed to practice until my dad went to bed. Thinking back, I should apologize to my siblings. When it was time to sign up for band classes at school, the family had an old trombone that we fixed up, and that is what I played.

I participated in a drum and baton corps and a drum and bugle corps as a musician from a very young age through high school, as well as other school music activities. Then, while attending Bowling Green State University, I earned a Bachelor of Arts in Music Education.

My first “real” job was in northwest Ohio in Hardin County at the Upper Scioto Valley Local School District teaching instrumental music 5-12. I stayed there for four years. I was then offered a job at West Muskingum in instrumental music 6-12, including marching band and pep band. I moved to Zanesville knowing no one.

I taught middle school/high school for four more years. During that time I met my husband, Todd Hixson. A position came open (formerly held by Mindy Patterson) at the elementary level, and from that time on I taught only young children. Due to the fact that I taught in all of the elementary buildings in the district, I had 700-800 children per week. I feel blessed to have had a career where I have been acknowledged by students, families and faculty as a positive influence in teaching. I was twice teacher of the year at Dillon and Falls Elementary Schools, Ohio Music Educator of the Year for Elementary Level, and twice recognized by Day Break Rotary. I have had the privilege of working with thousands of children through music.

Todd and I have twin boys, Daniel and Steven. Daniel is a student at The Ohio State University studying communications. Steven is at Baldwin Wallace University Conservatory of Music where he is studying music composition.

After 30 years in the public schools I chose to retire in 2014. During that year, I was asked to play as a church pianist for First Christian Church for their 8:30 service. I found I really liked playing for church and practicing again. I was led to Trinity United Presbyterian knowing you wanted an organist/pianist. I have had limited experience on the organ and have been studying with Jim McLaughlin to learn more about the organ. I am a work in progress when it comes to being a church musician.

You may have seen the stone cross lying in a garden near the front entrance and wondered where it came from. One day a man came to the church and said he had a stone cross that once belonged to his neighbor who is now deceased. His neighbor told him that the cross came from the roof of Forest Avenue Presbyterian Church and that he wanted it returned to the Presbyterians. Dale Vandembark and Bill Miska retrieved the cross, which was sinking into the ground behind this man's garage. The Building and Grounds Committee found pictures of Forest Avenue Presbyterian church showing a Presbyterian Cross on the roof. It had a ring surrounding the intersection. Obviously, the cross we received was not from the roof of Forest Avenue Presbyterian Church. Consequently, we have no clue of its origin, but it does show signs of once being mounted upright on a solid base. Pastor Allison, a weightlifter, hefted the cross to its current position and estimated its weight at 100 pounds.

Reaching Out to Our Neighbors—With the generosity of our church family, we donated many items during June, in conjunction with the VBS mission project, to the **First Putnam Overnight Shelter**. As they continue to face many obstacles, they have been able to keep their doors open as they resolve issues within the building. We also collected many items during July for Eastside Community Ministry's annual **Tools for School Project**. This year backpacks were packed with needed supplies for 1012 students. Those who volunteered to help pack the backpacks were told about the many expressions of gratitude by parents who registered their children for the backpacks. Each month the items from the food pantry shelf are taken to the **Coburn UMC Food Pantry**. Many words of thanks have always been expressed wherever and whenever items have been taken to the recipients of our donations.
